

White Thinclads Trip Blue; Bill Ash Wins Nittany Mile

A cold, windy day plus a rain-soaked track kept the crowd small and the times slow but it could not dull the splendid track and field show put on by alumni and present Penn State thinclads on Beaver Field Saturday afternoon.

In a thrilling 16-gem program most of the events were even closer than the final 82-75 margin by which the White cindermen defeated the Blue.

Worth admission price all by itself was the spectacle of three "name" runners in past and present intercollegiate footracing circles staging a great race in the Mother's Day Invitation Nittany Mile.

Ashenfelter Cops Mile

Former Lion distance star Curt Stone, clad in his USA Olympic track suit, found the mile a little too short, yet he made Bill Ashenfelter and Bob Freebairn go all out to beat him. Despite adverse conditions Bill did a creditable 4:18.8 to beat Bob by a yard and Stoney by four.

As soon as Penn State's recordholder Chuck Drazenovich got readjusted to the shot put circle he fouled his first two tosses—he heaved the shot 47 feet 5 and one-half inches to win the event for the Whites.

Double Winners

Bill Lockhart and Jim Finn, double winners, led the Blue team to its dominance of running events.

Flying Finn, a frosh, streaked to a 9.9 100 victory and just edged White's Bill Polito by the margin of a chest expansion in a 22:2 220.

Fierce competitor Lockhart copped the three-man blanket finish of the 440 by scant inches over John McCall and Ollie Sax. Warning of the drama of the race was indicated by three breaks on starter Norm Gordon. When the race was finally off fairly, the White's Guy Kay took the lead, which he held tenaciously until the far turn.

Stretch Drive

Sax took the lead there and as Mac brought the crowd up with his characteristic stretch kick, the two battled each other down the stretch. Then from obscurity Lockhart zoomed up on the outside to win.

Loekie closed his all triumphant day with a 49.4 anchor quarter for the winning Blue mile relay quartet which included John Lauer, Bill Kilmer and McCall.

One of the more eye-opening performances was frosh Red Hollen's romping win in the two mile for the Blues. Red took over the lead from pacesetter Jack St. Clair on the fifth lap and looked better every quarter which followed to finish in 9:47.4, just 1.3 from Jerry Karver's freshman record.

Pierson Wins 880

Dave Pierson for the White uncorked a tremendous stretch kick to win the 880 in 2:00.3. Fourth on the last turn, Dave rolled past early pacesetter Lou Gomlick and then eight yards from the tape he caught the leader, Bob Roessler.

In the photo finish the White's

George Kline nosed out frosh Ed Snodgrass in the 120 high hurdles. The result was the same in the 220 lows going over the last hurdle where Kline led by two yards. But coming down George stumbled and while he was staggering to the tape Snodgrass nipped him.

Owen Wilkinson for the Blues copped the pole vault with a jump of 12 feet 6 inches although he soared over 13 feet after the meet had officially closed.
