At 9:30 a.m. tomorrow, south of the Armory, the 112th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, State College unit of the Pennsylvania Air National Guard, will hold demonstrations of radar equipment, picking up the flights of Navy and Air Force planes provided surrounding trees and buildings do not interfere.

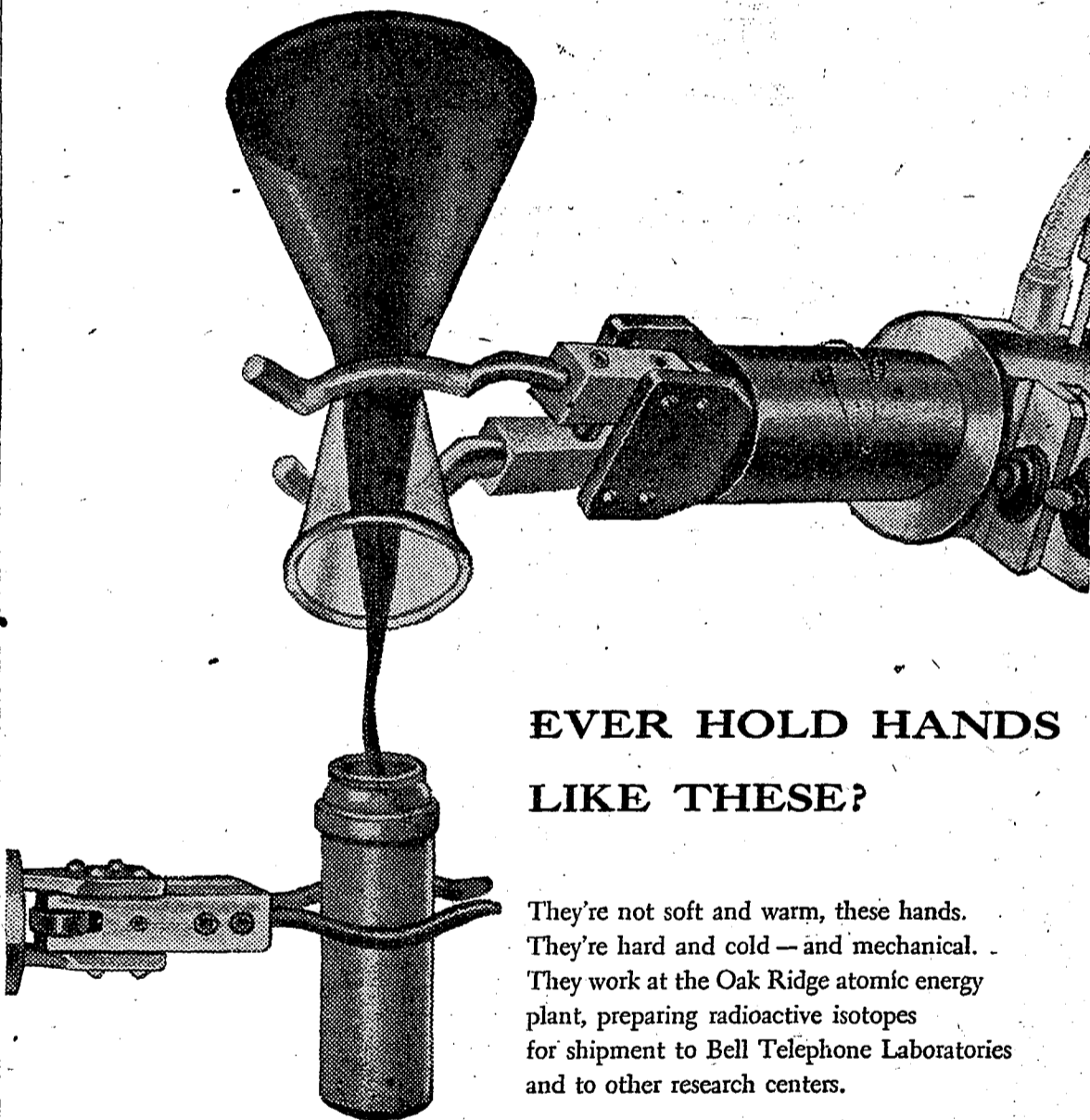
