 (3) Engaging in political cooperation, through the United Nations, to settle those disputes which are constantly arising among nations of different cultures and ideals.

(4) Developing, through the United Nations, central power which the peace-loving peoples of the world may use.

"Today," Dr. Eisenhower said, "it is as important for our citizens to understand the world, and the global consequences of our domestic and foreign policies, as it was for us not so many years ago to understand our own community, and, at most, our nation."

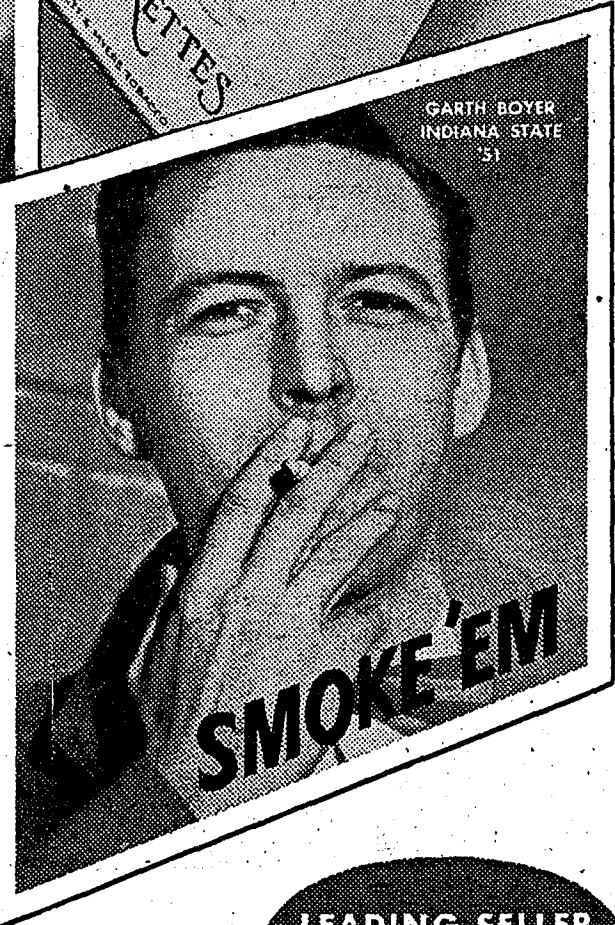
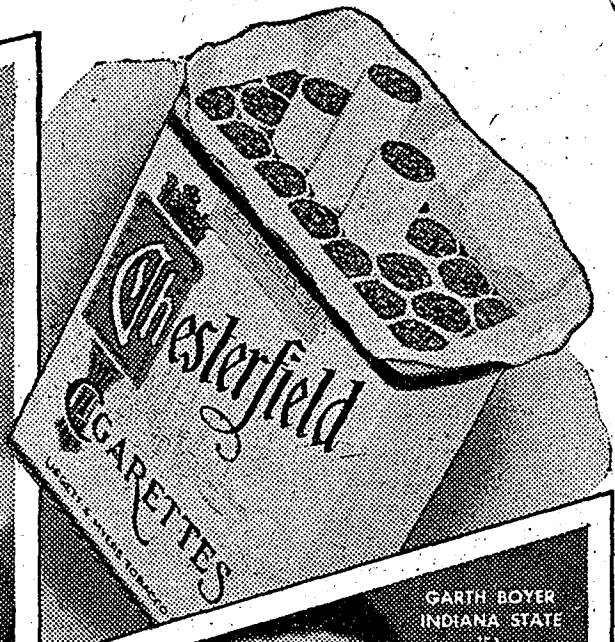
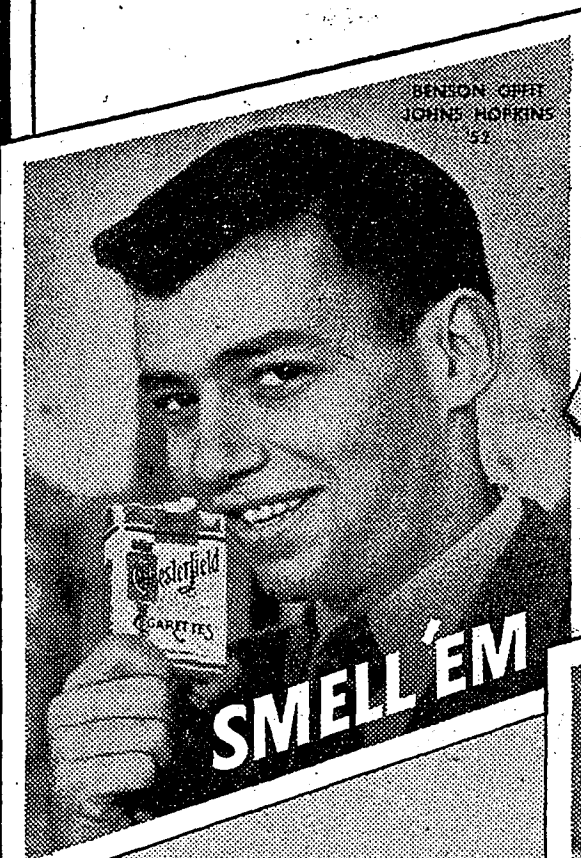
