6. Complete registration as same as those who have pre-registered.

 People's Democratic Republic and so forth and so forth of Korea."

Closing with a plea for help for the suffering people of Korea, Dr. You said they needed food-stuffs, clothing, medicines and housing. He described the suffering caused by war and asked the radio men "to take this awful story to the most generous people on the face of the earth... the American nation."

Other speakers in the program discussed various phases and problems of radio and television today. Bob Prince, sportscaster for the Pittsburgh Pirates, and for Penn State football, spoke in the opening session. John D. Scheuer spoke on Television and Education.
