Dr. John R. Richards, executive assistant to the president of Wayne University, Detroit, Mich., has been appointed to a new position on the staff of the Secretary of the Army as Special Assistant for Education.

The appointment was made by Secretary of the Army Frank Pace Jr., immediately following the signing by the President of the new Universal Military Training and Service Bill.

Dr. Richards, a native of Scranton and a 1930 graduate of the College, served on the faculty from 1930 until 0ct. 3, 1936, when he resigned as director of arts and science extension to accept a position at Wayne University.
