A close investigation of the request for investigation might save the Legion from some embarrassment later. A false cry or two now could be a detriment to some worthwhile work of the organization in the future.

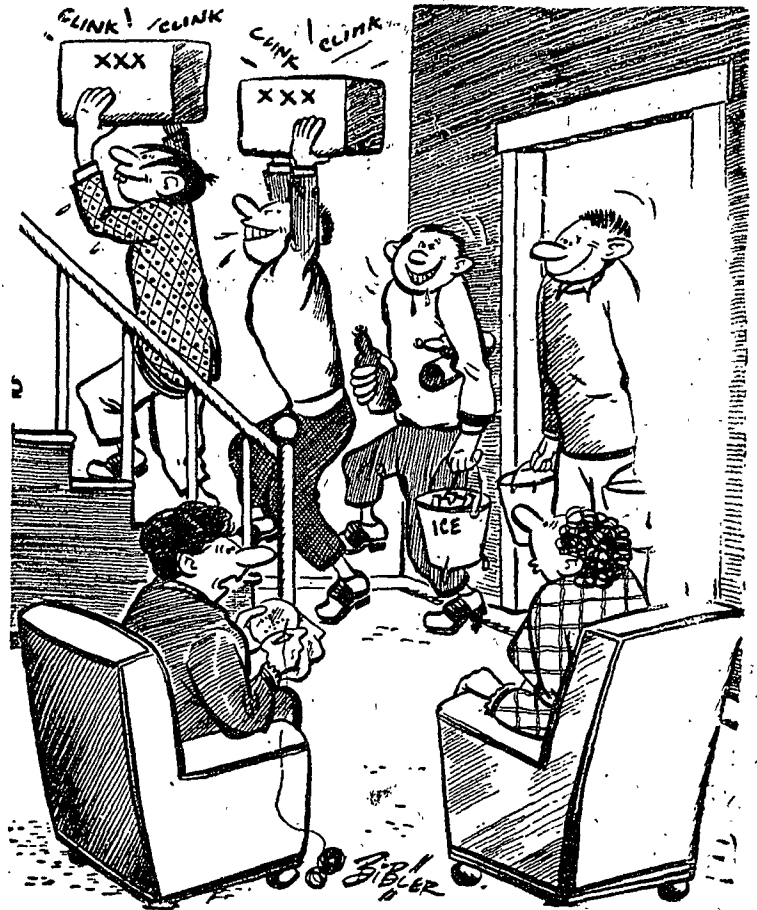

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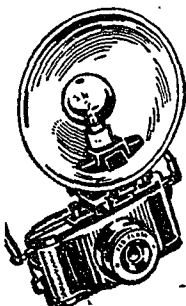
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
