

Rev. Harshbarger Named Chaplain

The Rev. Luther H. Harshbarger, general secretary of the Penn State Christian Association, has been named chaplain of the College, succeeding James T. Smith. The appointment became effective Sept. 1, and Reverend Harshbarger will continue his duties with the Christian Association.

Smith, who had been chaplain since 1946, left this summer for Los Angeles, Calif., where he will serve as associate general secretary of the Southern Council of Protestant Churches.

Reverend Harshbarger, who has been working with the Christian Association for two years, was born in Mifflin county, attended Lewistown High School, and was graduated from the McVeytown High School. He attended Millersville State Teachers College, Bethany Biblical Seminary School of Music, and received his bachelor of arts degree at McPherson College, Kansas.

Entering Yale Divinity School in 1939, Reverend Harshbarger received a Bachelor of Divinity Degree. He has also taken graduate work at the Temple University of Theology and at Yale Divinity School.

At McPherson College, Reverend Harshbarger served as assistant dean of men and director of the employment bureau. From 1942 to 1944, he was pastor of the Church of the Brethren at Amble and from 1945 to 1949, was associated with the World's YMCA in prisoner of war work in Europe.

Campus Patrol Polices College

The Campus Patrol, commanded by Captain Philip Mark, is the police force of the campus. The work of the patrol includes traffic direction, the checking of buildings, and investigation of extraordinary happenings at the College.

Forty-eight men make up the Campus Patrol, 30 of which are students working part-time. The patrol also employs four day and 13 night patrolmen who work full time. The force was organized in 1926 as a generalized watchman service.

The patrol is part of the department of the physical plant and is governed by regulations set up by the Board of Trustees. Applications for a position as patrolman may be obtained at the patrol office, 320 Old Main.

AIM Begins Fourth Year On Campus

The Association of Independent Men begins its fourth year on campus this fall, its membership being composed of all non-fraternity men at the College.

Controlled by a board of governors under a constitution instituted last year, AIM will be working to "consolidate the strength of the independent man toward a goal of service to himself, others, and to the College, which is a perpetual symbol of the service of past generations," according to John Laubach, AIM president.

Four Areas Represented

The Board of Governors is composed of presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries, and treasurers of the four men's dorm councils, as well as representatives-at-large elected by men in town, and in the West Nittany, and Pollock dormitories.

Officers of this year's Board of Governors, elected last semester, are Laubach, president; John Stoudt, vice-president; William Brown, secretary, and Ray Evert, treasurer.

Laubach said the Board of Governors must improve its efforts to develop the ideas contributed from the various living areas. AIM, represented by Laubach, holds a seat on All-College cabinet, where it can express the views of independent men.

The board of governors determines programs and policies for all four councils. It returns 40 percent of its income to the councils for their operation. It also publishes the Independent, a bi-weekly newspaper, with the cooperation of Leonides, independent women's organization.

Do You Know Your Extension Number?

Registration officials have requested residents of all campus dormitories except Atherton, McElwain, and Simmons Halls, to include the extension numbers of the nearest telephone when filling out forms requiring campus telephone numbers.

The number for all dormitories is State College, 5051. All residents of dormitories having extension numbers must also include a further designation, i.e., 5051-184.

Since residents of Atherton, Simmons, and McElwain have private telephones, only the number 5051 need be listed.

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
