

Foreign Ministers Near German Peace Settlement

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14—(AP)—The Western Big Three foreign ministers neared final agreement today on the terms of a "liberal" peace settlement for Western Germany.

Although behind schedule in their talks, the three ministers nevertheless hoped to wind up their five-day conference with a formal joint announcement of their decisions around noon tomorrow.

Agreements Secret

Details of agreements reached so far have been kept secret. But informed diplomats say that in considering a new "peace contract" for West Germany the ministers have decided to reserve Allied rights to intervene in German affairs under unusual circumstances.

Chief among these is reported to be the right for the Allies to step in if Communists threaten the survival of the German republic either by a domestic power grab or outside attack.

Settlement Generous

Generally, however, diplomats connected with the conference describe the proposed settlement as "very generous." It provides, they said, for far greater German control over domestic and foreign policy matter.

The settlement is to be called a "contractual arrangement" with the West German government, but is obviously designed to substitute for a Soviet-blocked peace treaty. It would replace the present American-British-French occupation statute and need not, under present arrangements, be approved by Congress.

Allies Ban Czech Flights

FRANKFURT, Germany, Sept. 14—(AP)—The western Allies have forbidden further flights across West Germany by the Government Air Line of Communist Czechoslovakia, which is at odds over the Oatis case and other issues.

The air ban went into effect without publicity at midnight Tuesday, it was confirmed today. Czech planes must make long detours over the Soviet occupation zone to the Baltic if they attempt to continue flying to western capitals such as Brussels and Amsterdam.

United States, British and French high commissioners informed the Czech military mission in Berlin in a brief note Monday that they had suspended Czech flight privileges "until further notice."

They gave no explanation, but the action is known to be one of several punitive measures the U.S. government has drafted as a reprisal for the Czech imprisonment of Associated Press correspondent William N. Oatis, sentenced to 10 years on a charge of spying.

The air ban came amid these other developments in Czech-American relations:

1. Virtual complete independence for the West German regime in foreign policy and domestic matters.
2. Abolition of the present Allied three power high commission and substituting ambassadors.
3. Changing the status of occupation troops to defense forces.

Government Begins Priority System

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14—(AP)—The government today set up a new clear-all-tracks priority signal in a move to unsnarl traffic jams in the nation's multi-billion-dollar defense production program.

The new "super" priority will be designated by the symbol "DX".

It will be used chiefly to speed the production of atomic weapons and other urgent military supplies—tanks, guns, planes, etc.

The National Production Authority (NPA) said it hoped the new "DX" rating would break an increasing number of log-jams now stalling vital military orders in plants overloaded with priority orders.

The agency said it will be "an emergency device, strictly limited in use," to be applied only when the armed forces need it to rush

Advanced AROTC Closes Wednesday

Applications for enrollment in the Advanced Course, Air Force ROTC will be accepted until Wednesday, Lt. Col. Jack W. Dieterle, professor of air science and tactics, announced.

Applicants must have four more semesters of college work remaining before graduation, must pass a physical examination, must have a satisfactory academic record, and must have completed a two-year basic course in ROTC or have had one year of active duty with the armed forces.

Those students accepted will be deferred from induction until the completion of the course. They will be commissioned second lieutenants in the U.S. Air Force Reserve.
