

# Between the Lions

An encouraging note to future Penn State football teams is that the entire tentative 1952 offensive backfield will return next year. Tony Rados, T-formation quarterback, is a sophomore; Bob Pollard and Ted Shattuck, halfbacks, are juniors; and fullback, Paul Anders, is a junior.

Sophomores slated for heavy duty this season are quarterback Bob Szajna, halfback Dick Jones, and fullback Matt Yanosich. These three were standouts for Earl Bruce's freshman team last season.

Dick Jones, Bellevue High School's former WPIAL Class B back, could be the answer to Coach Rip Engle's search for a scat back. Jones, unheralded until the end of the fresh campaign last fall, developed into a breakaway runner despite his 160 pound stature. Skeptics wondered how he would fare in varsity competition, but thus far he has done well in pre-season drills. Teamed with diminutive Earl Mundell, this duo should give opposing linemen plenty to worry



about on kick-off and punt returns.

Seven men who scored points last football season are returning to grid action this fall. Fullback Paul Anders, who was second in team scoring with 24 points, heads the group. Ted Shattuck tallied 18 markers, and Bob Pollard, Bill Abbot, Art Betts, Andy Silock, and Bill Leonard each scored a touchdown. Collectively, they were responsible for 72 of the Lions' 141 points last year.

True Magazine's Football Yearbook lists State's 215 pound tackle, Ed Hoover, as one of the outstanding tackles in the East. Look Magazine's predictions mention the Lions' Tony Rados, and Ted Shattuck as outstanding Eastern performers. Brad Glass, Princeton, who defeated Homer Barr in the Eastern intercollegiate wrestling tournament is being groomed as an All-American candidate.

# Banner IM Year Seen by Bischoff

This year should be the College's biggest in intramural athletics, according to Eugene Bischoff, intramural director. All indications point to a better year in a program that has been surpassing itself since its birth in 1931.

All men students may participate in any IM sport, providing they have not won a varsity letter in it. Last year, over 16,000 participants took part in the program's 1656 different contests.

### 17 Tournaments

Seventeen IM tournaments will be held this year. Touch football will open the program late this month and before soccer winds up the activities in the spring, students will be able to participate in tennis singles and doubles, golf medal and team play, handball singles and doubles, horseshoes singles and doubles, basketball, swimming, wrestling, boxing, badminton, track, and volleyball.

Softball was dropped from the program last year because of lack in facilities, Bischoff said. He has high hopes, however, that the sport may be resumed this year.

Most intramural contests are held in the evening, excepting those that demand daylight. The program is run in two divisions, fraternity and independent. The two divisions do not compete against each other.

# Big Weekend on Slate For Schoolboy Gridders

HARRISBURG, Sept. 13—(AP)—Schoolboy football takes over Pennsylvania in force this weekend with practically all 800 teams scheduled for action.

Joining last week's early starters are the eastern powers of Allentown, Bethlehem, Easton, Norristown, Reading and Williamsport and a host of others. Many western teams play important games after initial warm up tilts.

Allentown and Bethlehem, the state's two strongest independents throughout the years, tackle Philadelphia schools in home games. Usually the upstaters have little trouble with the city schools but this year both Lehigh Valley schools have green teams. Allentown should be able to slip past Mastbaum High but Southern is expected to be too tough at this stage for Bethlehem.

Another top contest sends Dunmore, 25-14 winner over a good Lock Haven team, to Berwick, which surprised with power to

smother Hazel Township, 52-0.

An inter-sectional highlight sends Norristown, a Philadelphia Suburban League power, to Reading, rated in the rugged eight-team Central Penn conference. It's the season's opener for both squads but reports from Reading are a little more optimistic than those from Norristown.

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
