

Coffee Hours Highlight End of Formal Rushing

Formal rushing for the fall semester will draw to a close with 19 sororities holding formal coffee hours tonight from 7 to 8 and from 8:30 to 9:30.

Rushees may pick up invitations for coffee hours from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. today at the Panhellenic post office. Written replies are due at the post office by 1:30 p.m. Each rushee may attend two coffee hours.

At 4 p.m. rushees may find out the times at which they are to attend the coffee hours given by the sororities of their choice. Sorority members will call for the rushees at 6:45 p.m. and at 8:15 p.m.

Preferential cards may be signed by rushees from 9 to 10:30 tonight at the Panhellenic post office, and from 7:30 to 10:30 a.m. tomorrow in the Dean of Women's office, 105 Old Main. Each rushee may list a first and second choice. Sororities will turn in their bid lists tomorrow at the Dean of Women's office.

According to the system of preferential bidding, names of rushees and sororities appearing on bid lists and preferential cards remain confidential. The Dean of Women's office makes up the lists of acceptances for each sorority.

Written bids will be distributed at 4:45 p.m. tomorrow. Ribboning will follow at 7 p.m.

Informal rushing will begin Oct. 16, with open bidding continuing for the remainder of the semester.

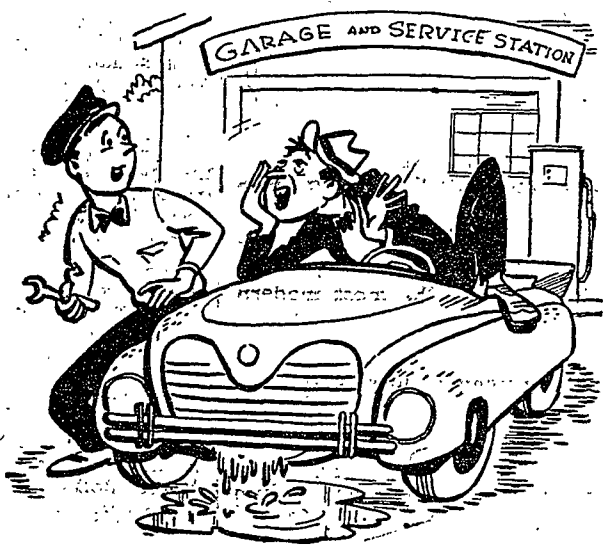
