Those who have passed the examination, even though they have not yet received their licenses, may join the station. Membership is also open to graduate students, faculty members, and employees of the College.

Emphasis is placed on economical production of field crops, maintenance of soil fertility by proper rotations, use of lime and fertilizers, and prevention of soil losses by erosion.

Other subjects include farm management, farm machinery, rural life and economic problems of the farmer.

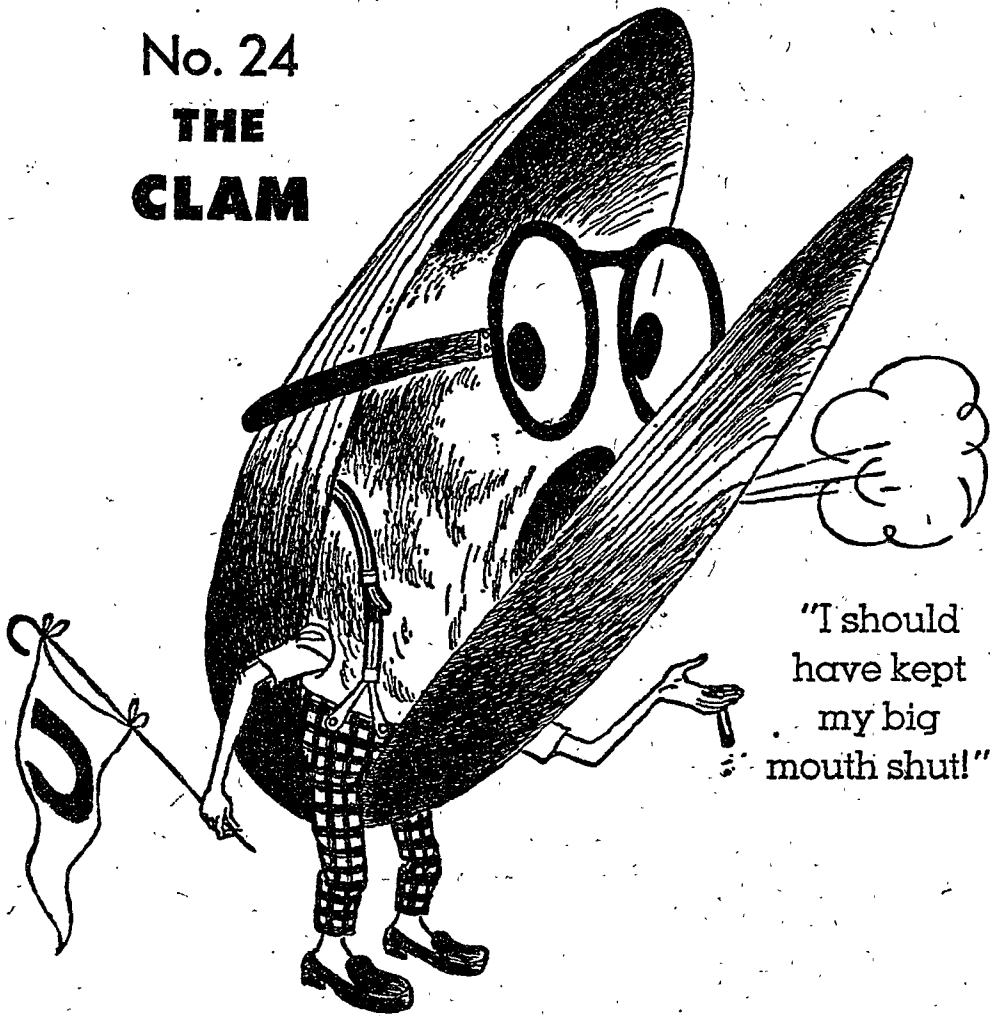
