

The Lion's Lair

This Bobby Reynolds of Nebraska is some football player. Just take a look at the records.

Last season, his sophomore year, Reynolds carried the ball 1342 yards to break the Big Seven Conference record, averaging 6.9 yards per carry, second best average in the country.

The flashy Nebraskan scored 2 touchdowns and kicked 25 points after touchdown for a total of 157 points and a new scoring record. He completed four of ten passes for 75 yards and caught 11 for 173 yards. Also a punter, Reynolds averaged 37.7 yards per kick.

A real stop-and-go runner, Reynolds went for 18

of his 22 TD's on runs of ten yards or more. Against Indiana, he scored on runs of 10 and 45 yards; against Minnesota, on runs of 67 and 22 yards; against Colorado, 80 and 11; Penn State, 19, 26, and 43; Missouri, 14, 35, and 33; Kansas State, 22, 15, and 22; and against mighty Oklahoma, on runs of 20, 13, and 16.



In the Indiana, Colorado, and Penn State games, he scored all of Nebraska's points.

After the season had ended, the Cornhusker ace was picked to All-America teams by All-Players, Associated Press, International News Service, and the Football Writers. The Pop Warner Foundation of Philadelphia selected him "Football Player of the Year."

But Mr. Reynolds isn't a one sport man. He first attracted attention with his baseball ability at Grand Island High School in

Omaha. Last year for Nebraska he batted .360 and led the conference in stolen bases.

During his high school career, he also found time to make the all-state basketball squad. And as could be assumed he also made the all-state football team.

So it's no wonder that Nebraska's football stock will go up when Bobby Reynolds finally returns to full time duty. What Penn State fans want to know is, "Will it be today?" That's what we'd like to know, too.

If Reynolds doesn't play today, look for Nick Adduci, Cornhusker fullback, to be Nebraska's offensive spearhead.

Bill "Biff" Glassford, Nebraska head coach, is a former teammate of Lion assistant coach Frank Patrick. Both played their college football at the University of Pittsburgh. Pat did all the scouting of the Nebraska games.

Tom Carodine, Nebraskan halfback, is a former president of Boy's Town. He was an all-state quarterback there. He is now married and has one son.

Four Pennsylvania boys grace the Nebraska lineup. They are John Bordogna, James Jones, and John Machisic all from Turtle Creek, and Bob Mullen from Connelville.

Nittany Runners Seek 8th Straight Dual Meet Win Against Cornell Today

Big Red Hopeful Of Avenging Last Year's 15-50 Loss

Unbeaten in dual meet competition since 1949, Penn State's cross-countrymen will try for their second straight win of the season and their eighth in a row over the past three campaigns when they race Cornell at 2 p.m. today on the College course.

The five mile run starts and finishes in Beaver Field with most of the running action visible on the golf course.

Coach Chick Werner's 1950 national champs opened its season last week with a 19-36 victory over Pitt. Although the score was not too close, the Lions were hardly a resemblance to last year's team.

Win First Three Places In beating the Panthers, the Nittany thinclads ran off with the first three places. Pitt took the fourth position and the Lions fifth. But State's fifth finisher was sandwiched in eighth place surrounded by Pitt runners from sixth to 11th places.

Cornell also got off to a winning start last week downing Colgate 25-32. Although not a strong harrier team in recent years, the Big Red runners showed a fine team spirit against Colgate by placing five men together in third place. This bunching won the meet for Cornell even though Colgate took the first two spots.

Last fall at Cornell the Lions shut out the Red runners from the first seven places en route to a 15-50 victory.

Ash and Foster Return Two of the harriers responsible for that rout are running against Cornell today. Both Bill Ashenfelter and Captain Dud Foster, who tied for first last fall at Ithaca, are ready to move up from their eighth and third places respectively against Pitt.

Winner and runnerup against the Panthers, Lamont Smith and Red Hollen will toe the line today for the Lions along with Jack Horner, who finished fifth last year.

Bob Roessler, Pete Judd, and Carl Godshall, 12th to 14th last Saturday, also go for the Lions today. So will Pete Sarantopoulos who didn't finish the season opening race.

Three new Lions have made the starting squad taking over the place of Dave Pierson, Bob Gehman, and John Davidson.

These new varsity starters today are frosh John Chillrud (the only freshman aside from Smitty), junior Don Gaddes, and varsity numeral winner last fall Stan Lindner.

For Cornell the top men to watch are the five who tied for third against Colgate. Among that five were Bob Stuckelman and Robertson. Both are senior runners.

Willig, Pierson and O'Brien all tied with Stuckelman and Robertson so they may be just as good. Other Red runners to contend with are Bob Kahrs and Les Knapp who were 10th and 11th against Colgate.

Bob Grossman and Bill Albers are also possible starters for the Cornellians.

Sigma Nu, 1950 Champs, Edge Tekes for 2nd Win

Defending fraternity football champions, Sigma Nu, kept its three year winning streak going last night by scoring a 7-0 victory over Tau Kappa Epsilon in the IM grid tournament.

A 70-yard pass play, Mike Kirshner to Bob Leyburn, gave Sigma Nu its second win in the single elimination tournament. The Tekes threatened late in the game when they moved inside the Sigma Nu 10 yard line, but lacked the scoring punch to push the ball into the end zone.

A brilliant 73 yard six-man scoring combination by Sigma Nu was nullified in the first half when the ball slithered to the ground from the arms of the last man in the end zone. The play started on an interception on the Sigma Nu 27 yard line.

Delts Win

Delta Tau Delta spotted Alpha Chi Rho an early touchdown and then came roaring back in the second half to defeat the Alpha Chi Rho club, 7-6. Newk Grubb intercepted on the Delts' 32 and flipped to Bill Johnson for the lone Alpha Chi Rho tally. The extra point was missed. DTD's Darrell Shoff countered in the second half by picking off an Alpha Chi Rho pass and returning 30 yards to the enemy 18. On third down and still 18 from the tying score, Shoff passed out to Dave Pine who left-handed it to Van Ernest in the end zone for the six-pointer. Shoff then hit Earl Van Alst for the tie-breaking point.

A last-ditch Alpha Chi Rho drive carried to the DTD 19, but the Delts' defense, sensing a win, tightened and held for the second round decision.

Triangle Wins Overtime

A hustling Triangle squad edged Phi Sigma Delta from further contention, 7-6, in an overtime game. Triangle recovered an onside kick to open the game and marched straight up the field, climaxed by a Don Brainerd to Rodney Beck to Robert Brooks to Ken Baubite pass good for 38 yards and the score. Phi Sigma Delta tied it up on the last play of the first half on a 28 yard aerial from Fred Levin to Fred Singer to Max Williams.

In the overtime series, Don Schlegal's flat pass to Dick Dorshner carried to the 45 which was good enough for the point and the 7-6 victory.

Warning Given Duck Hunters

HARRISBURG, Oct. 12—(AP)—The duck hunting season opened today in the first big shooting event of the year. But hunters are warned by the state Game Commission that semi-automatic and repeating shotguns must be plugged to three-shell capacity. They must be plugged in such a way that the plug cannot be removed without dis-assembling the gun.

Special federal migratory bird-hunting stamps must be displayed by all hunters over 16 years of age. And the commission says there's no open season this year on snow geese, swan and Wilson's snipe. The duck season this year 15; five days longer than last year.

Here are the daily bag limits: ducks—four daily with one woodchuck, two day's bag as possession limit; geese—daily bag limit two, possession limit two; Brant—three a day, three possession limit; American and red-breasted mergansers—25 daily bag limit, no possession limit after the first day. Brant may be hunted only between Oct. 12 and 20.
