

Pirates, Monsters Meet Tonight at Houseparties

Pirates, monsters, Arabs, and comic strip characters will mingle tonight at houseparties planned by 45 fraternities.

Acacia, decorated as a theater complete with pillars, cameras, and spotlights, will have as its theme "Hollywood Premiere." Dillan Saup's orchestra will provide the music for the costume affair.

"Comic Capers" will be the theme at Alpha Chi Rho, with comic strip character, decorations, and music by Jimmy Spaniel's orchestra.

Guests at Alpha Chi Sigma will come as song titles. Decorations will feature silhouettes of musical instruments and notes, and music will be furnished by John Brown's orchestra.

Alpha Epsilon Pi will feature "Sweetheart's Serenade," a semi-formal pledge dance. Decorations will include hearts, kissing couple silhouettes, and a large heart over the entrance.

Alpha Gamma Rho's theme will be the "Klondike Kraze," with decorations built around an igloo and a Gay Nineties dance hall.

"An Evening in Seville" will be the theme of a joint houseparty held by Alpha Phi Alpha and Omega Psi Phi at the latter's house.

"Pirates' Haven" is the theme of Alpha Sigma Phi's party. Guests will enter by walking up a gangplank flanked by two cannons, a skull and bones, and flags. Inside will be a ship's wheel and the Five Blue Flames orchestra in a rowboat.

Decorated as a tent, the main room at Alpha Tau Omega will carry out the theme of "A T Oasis Arab Party."

Alpha Zeta's "Opposites" costume party will have one group of dark, cold rooms and another group of warm, gay, bright ones. Duke Morris' Melody Men will provide the music.

Decorations featuring a Times Square theme will deck Beta Sigma Rho's "Broadway Party." Entertainment will include a show by the members, and Lynn Christy's orchestra will play.

Beta Theta Pi will hold a Halloween Party, complete with ghosts, witches, and goblins. Jim Erb's orchestra will play for the costume party.

A semi-formal pledge dance will be held at Chi Phi. Decorations will be modeled after ancient Rome.

"Destination Venus" at Delta Chi will employ an interplanetary theme.

Delta Sigma Phi will hold its annual "Pink Elephant Ball," with appropriate decorations. Don Trostle's orchestra will furnish the music.

Party-hoppers at Delta Tau Delta will be greeted by a Frankenstein monster, a dummy in a coffin, cobwebs, and weird tombstones.

A square dance with callers will be held at Delta Theta Sigma.

"Suppressed Desire" will be the theme at Delta Upsilon, with guests expressing their secret desires, with all varieties of costumes.

Kappa Delta Rho will greet its guests at the "Bedlam Ball," and will conduct them through padded cells, snake pits, and rooms littered with "dead bodies."

Kappa Sigma's "Indian Dance" will feature a tepee, and guests will come dressed as Indian braves and squaws.

Lambda Chi Alpha will have a "Dogpatch Saturday Social" with the music of Gerald Kehler's orchestra.

Guests at Phi Delta Theta will

join in the "Housewarming," an informal dance.

Phi Epsilon Pi's Buccaneer Ball will be modeled after "Treasure Island," and will feature costumes and appropriate decorations.

Costumed comic strip characters will feel right at home among the Dog Patch and Space Ship decorations at Phi Gamma Delta and Sigma Phi Alpha.

To all those who wish to attend a theater party, Phi Kappa will be a haven. Would-be actors will be able to display their talents as the house becomes a stage.

The prevalence of spotted leopard cloth will be helpful to students who are planning to attend Phi Kappa Sigma's "Cave Man Cavern" party.

The Phi Kappa Tau yacht will meet disaster in order to carry out a "Ship Wreck" theme. Partygoers will wear appropriate costumes.

A Far and Near Eastern atmosphere will prevail at the Phi Sigma Delta "Orient" and Phi Sigma Kappa "Arabian Nights" parties. Buddhas and dragons will decorate the walls of Phi Sigma Delta, but house partygoers will not wear costumes. On the other hand Phi Sigma Kappa Arabians will don billowy yards of material.

A lot of "bums" will infest the "Hobo Jungle" at Pi Kappa Alpha. Typical pictures from a hobo hangout will adorn the walls.

All leftover ghosts and goblins will be welcome at the Pi Kappa Phi Halloween party. Scoop McKinney's orchestra will furnish the music. Guests will wear costumes.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon will bring the "Showboat" to town. No special costumes will be worn.

Sigma Chi will hold its annual pledge dance, and banquet. The pledges will present a skit.

Sigma Phi Epsilon's "Big Top" will be a masquerade party, with guests wearing costumes and decorations following a circus theme.

A combo will provide the music for Sigma Phi Sigma's "Bop City." Costumes and decorations will center on a nightclub theme.
