

Air Convention Delegates Return to State

Ten Penn State representatives of the Arnold Air Society recently returned from their National convention at Miami, Fla.

The group left Olmstead Air Force base in Middletown, Pa. in a C-47. Maj. John Dailey of the AROTC detachment at the College was pilot, and Capt. David Evans was co-pilot. It took the group nine hours to make the 1300 mile journey with only one stop at Shaw air base in South Carolina. The return non-stop flight took six and one-half hours.

Eight delegates from Lehigh University and two from Duquesne also accompanied the group.

Convention headquarters in Miami were at the Cadillac Hotel on North Beach. The ten delegates from Penn State were quartered at the Ocean Grand Hotel on Miami beach. About 1500 delegates from 80 different colleges and universities attended the convention. The largest delegation (70) was from Ball State College.

Official representatives from the College were John Frantz, squadron commander, and Capt. Robert Goodman, executive squadron officer. Other delegates were Paul Beighley, John Cable, Neil Carlson, Clifford Dreiser, Richard Patterson, Elliot Smith, William Sullivan, and Benjamin Wiater.

Tired of Meals? Let Food Service Try Your Recipe

Johnston pointed out that even though we may have to give up cars, washing machines, radios, and other things, other countries are in a worse situation.

There has been a 23 percent rise in cost of living in France, 15 percent in Germany, 24 percent in Norway, 50 percent in Austria. This is compared to an 8 percent rise in Americans' cost of living from June 1950, the start of the Korean war, to January 1951 when controls went into effect.

We exercise great influence, Johnston said, and from his travels he found that the rest of the world does not hate America, as is often charged. Rather the other countries have "great admiration, a little awe, and some respect" for us.

Johnston leaves the Economic Stabilization Agency Friday to resume the presidency of the Motion Picture Association of America, a job he has held since September 1945. He said that after being a bureaucrat for 11 months he has learned how to lose friends and drive away people, and had found that "no-body likes to be stabilized."
