His fourth place finish in the IC4A's helped the Nittany runners win the championship. Hamill placed in several meets, and was the fifth State finisher in the Nationals.

# 19 Boxers Advance In IM Tournament

IM boxing concluded its first week of the 1951 tourney yesterday with 19 men moving up in seven divisions. Twelve fighters, 11 fraternity men and one independent, advanced through forfeits. Three 135-pound bouts featured the abbreviated seven-game card.

Independent Pinky Friedman took three rounds of backpedaling and countpunching to open up his big guns to earn a decision over Frances Farren. Just at the final bell did Friedman stop his retreat to stagger Farren with a series of lefts and rights that clinched the fight. A smaller Charles Kochanowski dropped Harris midway in the initial round with a quick right cross and outscrapped his opponent the remainder of the route for the nod. Another small man, Allan McChesney, outgunned and outmaneuvered his larger opponent, Bob Petrosky, Sigma Phi Alpha, all of the way for the three-round verdict.

Turns Slugger Two Beta Theta Pi boxers scored initial wins in their respective classes yesterday. Doby Lynch, in the 128-pound bracket, and Sam Wagner, 145 pounds, each grabbed decisions.

The sharp-jabbing Lynch turned slugger in the final round to score on a few well-placed shots to the head and snared the verdict over Phi Sigma Kappa's John Russ. Wagner earned a decision over an elusive Dave Colton, Tau Kappa Epsilon, for the other half of the Beta double. Colton's countpunching couldn't cope with Wagner's rugged in-fighting.

Many Forfeits The fraternity 165-pound division found two men advancing to the next round, one by way of the conventional decision and one by a shortened three-round go. Tau Phi Delta's Ed Kocjanic threw science and caution to the free breezes in his bout with Dick Dum, Alpha Gamma Rho, and grabbed the nod. Kocjanic utilized his reach to fullest advantage in the three-round affair. NEW YORK, Nov. 30—(AP)—Tommy Henrich's brilliant career with the New York Yankees ended today when the club revealed it was not renewing his coaching contract.

Henrich's "unavailability to work outside the metropolitan area" was given as the reason for his release by George Weiss, Yankee general manager.

The Yanks will not replace Henrich, continuing with a three-man staff of Bill Dickey, Frank Crosetti, and Jim Turner as Casey Stengel's aides.

The 35-year-old outfielder-first baseman who retired from the active list a year ago is associated with George Stirnweiss, the former Yankee infielder now with Cleveland, as distributor for a beer company.

Four Nittany Lion opponents placed on the first team. They were Nick Liotta and Joe DeRose of Villanova, Harry Agganis of Boston U., and Jim Monahan of Rutgers. Four more opponents received honorable mention. They were Bill Hegarty, Ben Addiogo, and Bob Haner of Villanova, and Bob Bestwick of Pitt.
