(continued from page 1) ing that the small amount mined domestically is obtained almost entirely from the Colorado plateaus.

These uranium mines are owned by private individuals with two exceptions, Dr. Glennan said. All the mills used in processing the ore are also privately owned. In spite of the fact that the mines are privately owned, they operate under the stipulation that all the ore mined must be sold to the government, the AEC member said.

Contrary to common belief, ore deposits are not rich in uranium, he explained. If two pounds of pure uranium can be obtained from a ton of ore, the commission regards the ore as rich, he added.

The AEC was established almost wholly for developing atomic weapons, the commissioner explained. Towards this end over 6½ billion dollars have been spent since 1942. The commission owns 3800 square miles of land and plants in 24 states, Dr. Glennan said.

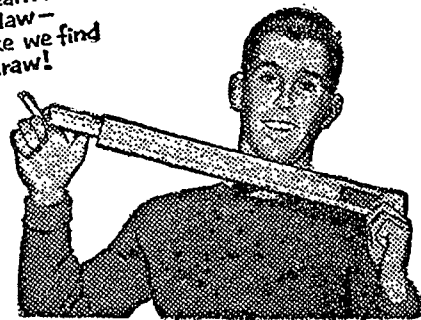
