Leonides Hears 3 Proposals

Poor shooting, characterized by a low percentage of foul shots made, was evident on both sides. Navy netted only one out of eight free throws, while Army connected with three of 13.

Nancy Jarden, of Army, was high scorer of the evening with 12 counters. Navy's Miller connected for nine points.
