Activities of professors at the College in the past few weeks have ranged from participation in UNESCO meetings to the publishing of articles.

Joseph F. O'Brien, professor of public speaking, has been named chairman of the public address section for meetings of the Speech Association of the Eastern States to be held in New York, April 17 to 19.

Thomas A. Hopking Jr., speech instructor, will present a report on a study he and Professor O'Brien have conducted.

Dr. Dagobert de Levie, assistant professor of German, is the author of an article, "Cotton Mather, Theologian and Scientist," published in the winter, 1951, issue of American Quarterly.

Scheduled to participate in a panel discussion on petroleum engineering education in New York City on Feb. 18 is Dr. John C. Calhoun, professor and chief of the division of petroleum and natural gas engineering at the College. This meeting will help determine ways in which petroleum engineering courses can be strengthened in the nation's colleges.

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College Adopts New Military Leave Policy

A new policy on leaves for College employees called for military training duty has been adopted, President Milton S. Eisenhower has announced.

The policy, approved by the Board of Trustees, states that the College will authorize military leaves up to 15 days per year.

The leave will be without salary unless the military base pay of the employee is less than his College salary would be for the same period. In these cases the College will pay the employee the difference in salary.

The employee may request that his entire absence for annual military training duty be charged to his accumulated vacation time rather than the time granted him as a leave if he prefers.

The policy does not apply for periods of less than seven days. If the training duty period exceeds 15 days the additional time may be charged to vacation time.

The policy does not apply to employees recalled to extended active duty. More than a year ago the College adopted a policy to cover reservists recalled for extended duty and personnel subject to the Selective Service act.

Postgraduate fellowships, one in chemistry and one in mechanical engineering, were continued under the provisions of grants from E. I. duPont de Nemours Co. The stipend of each will be \$1400 for single recipients or \$2100 for married recipients, in addition to \$1200 to the department concerned.

The fellowships will be directed by Dr. W. C. Fernelius, professor and head of the Department of Chemistry, and Norman R. Sparks, professor and head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

Another duPont grant provides \$2000 for continuation of research in the School of Agriculture on the availability of nitrogen from uramite. H. Burton Musser, professor of agronomy, directs the work.

The American Taxicab Association grant of \$100 will help to support the motor vehicle fleet supervisor training program conducted by the Institute of Public Safety. Amos E. Neyhart is administrative head.
