

Dr. Smiley Will Address Beta Theta Pi Conclave

Dr. E. Kenneth Smiley, vice president of Lehigh University, will be the principle speaker at the District VI and VII Beta Theta Pi conclave to be held at the Penn State chapter today and tomorrow.

Approximately 180 men are expected to attend from Beta Theta Pi chapters at Lehigh University, the University of Pennsylvania, Dickinson College, Washington and Jefferson College, Bethany College, West Virginia University, and Carnegie Institute of Technology.

The speaker is also chairman of the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education, the accrediting agency for the Middle Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. He is a member of the executive committee of the college entrance examination board.

Prior to holding his post as vice president, Smiley was director of admissions at Lehigh from 1938 to 1939 and assistant director of admissions from 1934 to 1938. Later, he served as Dean of Men at the University of North Dakota.

Dr. Smiley attended Dartmouth College and received his A.B. degree at Bowdoin College in 1921. He received his M.A. at Lehigh in 1935 and Moravian College conferred the L.H.D. degree upon him in 1947.

The conclave will open with a nominating committee meeting and mixer tonight.

dent, that the Psychology department would advise the elections committee on how questions were to be phrased and the poll conducted. He said that under these conditions he could see no reason why the elections committee couldn't handle the job.

The proposal was rejected by a vote of 19 to one, with two abstentions.

Marvin Krasnansky, chairman of the Board of Publications, said that if cabinet passed the amendment it was recording a vote of "no confidence" in itself and that the vote would be a direct slap at the representative form of government.

Krasnansky then stated that if cabinet is not representative then it should be "junked" and a new system set up, which would be representative.

"In the past week," Krasnansky said, "we have seen a disgusting display of conduct of student leaders and a half-a-dozen railroad attempts being made on behalf of this proposal." He further charged the backers of the proposal with imposing their presence on organizations to present their views.

Olmsted denied the allegation and said that his presence at every meeting he attended had been welcomed.

A petition was presented from the floor to Stanley Wengert, Interfraternity Council president,

by Robert Amole, ex-clique chairman of the State Party. Amole said that since the IFC had not met to consider the proposal, he had circulated a petition among fraternity presidents and representatives which requested Wengert to vote approval of the amendment. The petition was signed, Amole said, by a majority of IFC.

Robert A. Callahan, state council representative of the union, issued the following statement:

"What equalization did exist before the February increase was completely distributed. The membership requests re-establishment of pay equality where it did exist as in housing, dining commons, and certain other divisions of the physical plant."

Calling for a job security program, Callahan said, "The College's practice of dismissals with no regard to work performance, efficiency or length of service and haphazard transfer of employees must stop to eliminate the very low employee morale."
