

UN Seminar To Be Held March 27-30

The Penn State Christian Association, in cooperation with the Political Science department and the School of Education, will conduct a seminar at the United Nations Headquarters in New York City, March 27 to 30.

The program will include attendance at sessions of the United Nations, interviews with United Nations delegates, and a visit to the headquarters of the United States mission to the UN.

The purpose of the seminar is to help students gain a better understanding of the role of the United Nations in the world crisis, the responsibilities and relationships of religion to international order, and to show the students what they can do to further the purposes of the UN.

Registrations will be accepted at the PSCA office, 304 Old Main, until Monday afternoon, March 24. The cost for transportation, and room and board will be approximately \$25 to \$30.

The proposals were considered in the light of the relative educational and spiritual values of a campus project to one which would continue to give help to those outside the College who need it, Wilmer E. Kenworthy, director of student affairs, said.

The possibility of combining a campus and an off-campus project was also discussed but nothing specific was mentioned.

Kennedy to Talk At Priestley Lecture Series

Dr. Joseph W. Kennedy, chairman of the Department of Chemistry at Washington University, will speak on "Radioactive Atoms and Isotopic Tracers" at the 26th annual Priestley lecture series to be held April 21 to 25 at the College.

A graduate of the Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College in Texas, Dr. Kennedy obtained his master's degree from the University of Kansas and his doctor's degree from the University of California.

Awarded a merit medal for his work on the Manhattan Atom Project, Dr. Kennedy is known for his research on radioactive isotopes and "hot atom" chemistry.

He is a member of the American Chemical Society and the American Physical Society and is former director of the chemical and metallurgy division at the Los Alamos atom bomb laboratory.

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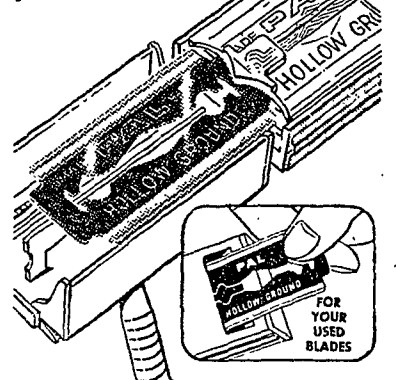
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
