The new proposal, he said, would cover all team expenses during competition trips, but that the costs of the practice judging trips would still be paid by team members members.

In his report, Mutchler pointed out that there are only 2062 actual parking spaces available on cam-pus and that there are 4127 cars owned and operated on the cam-pus. He stated that the only possible solution to the problem would be to cut down on the number of cars allowed on campus and to provide stricter enforce-ment of the regulations.

Under his plan, only 500 student commuters and 1458 faculty and staff members would be given permits to drive and park on campus. The rest of the spaces would be used for storage and service spaces.

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
