

Late Hours Granted For Next Weekend

Upperclass women will receive two o'clock permissions for next Friday night, second semester freshmen will get 2 one o'clocks next weekend, and first semester freshmen will get a one o'clock next Friday night and a twelve the following night.

The permissions were granted by the Women's Student Government Association Senate Wednesday night.

The senate unanimously approved the plan to raise student fees 25 cents per semester to pay expenses of judging teams.

Weston to Speak

Mary Jane Woodrow, WSGA president, and the newly elected president and vice president will be the official delegates of WSGA at the Eastern Regional Intercollegiate Association of Women Students convention to be held April 23 to 26 at the College.

Joan Lee, temporary chairman for the convention, said Pearl O. Weston, dean of women, will deliver the opening address April 24.

President Milton S. Eisenhower will speak at a luncheon that day. In the afternoon members of Blue Key, junior men's hat society, and Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity, will take delegates on a tour of the campus.

Christine Conaway, dean of women at Ohio State University, will speak April 25. Workshops and panel discussions will be held throughout the four day conference.

Constitutional Changes

Nancy White, chairman of the WSGA Freshman Council, said the council will give its recommendations for changes in customs to the proposed Freshman Customs Board. An amendment to the All-College Constitution to create the board has been read twice at All-College Cabinet and will be voted upon at the next cabinet meeting.

The Senate gave recommendations for constitutional changes to Jane Stiebert who will revise the constitution.

Joan Hutchon, junior senator, will be in charge of installation of WSGA officers on April 29.

May 3 was set as a tentative date for a WSGA retreat which will be held off campus.

Schug to Direct Speech Association

A chapter of the Intercollegiate Peace Speech Association will be established at Penn State under the direction of Clayton H. Schug, associate professor of public speaking.

The purpose of the association is to hasten world peace by acquainting undergraduate students with a broad knowledge of peace problems as a basis of world citizenship. The association stresses participation in the preparation and delivery of orations, extemporaneous speaking, and discussion with the aim of interesting college students in the problems of world peace.

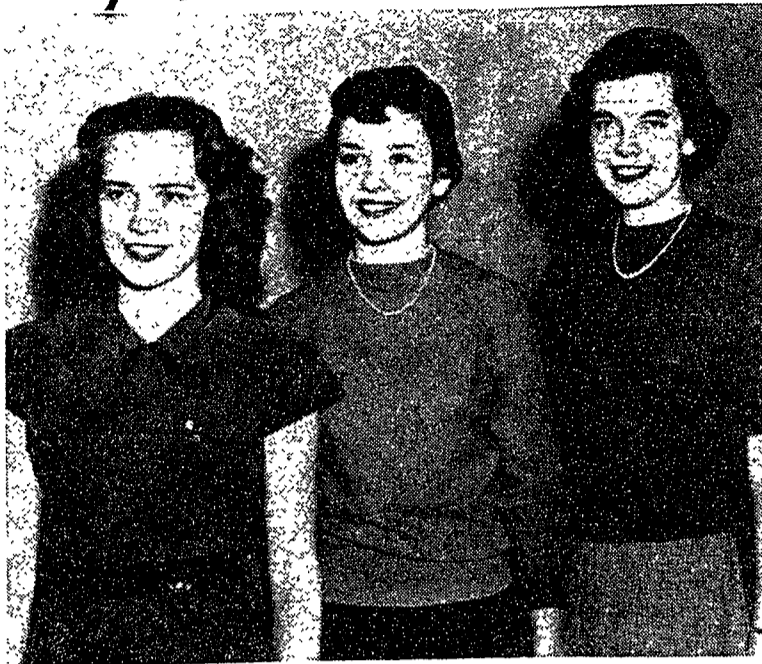

They will appear at a meeting of the Dairy Science Club at 7 p.m. Thursday in 117 Dairy building. The entire club will make the final selection.
