UN Official Will Speak Tomorrow

Gove Hambidge, regional representative to the director general, Food and Agriculture Organization, United Nations, will be the main speaker at the School of Home Economics Spring Weekend to be held tomorrow through Saturday.

Hambidge will discuss "Bread and Peace" at 4 p.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

Another feature of the weekend will be a 1952 American Theatre Wing community play, "And You Never Know," to be presented by six dramatics students Friday and Saturday.

2 Separate Casts
Scheduled for 8:30 p.m. Friday and 2 p.m. Saturday in 114 Home Economics, the play will be followed by a discussion led by Dr. Winoma L. Morgan, professor of child development and family relationships.

Two student directors, Yvonne Voight and Michael Forgacs, will direct two separate casts. Kelly Yeaton, assistant professor of dramatics, is supervising the production.

Hambidge played an important part in the establishment of the FAO. He was executive secretary of the UN Interim Commission of Food and Agriculture, which established the objectives and structure of FAO.

He served as director of information for FAO for three years and until his recent appointment as acting regional representative for North America, was editorial adviser to the Director General.

Hambidge was educated at Columbia University when he began a writing career. From 1922 to 1927 he was assistant editor of Cosmopolitan magazine and in 1935 he was appointed senior information specialist, Agricultural Adjustment Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

For the next six years he was the principal research writer and editor of the Yearbook of Agriculture, and later served three years as coordinator of the Agricultural Research Administration.

Ensign Cole graduated from Cornell University and is a member of Theta Xi.

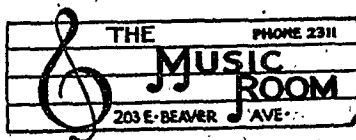
