

Strawberry Festival Scheduled for Tonight

The Strawberry Festival, sponsored by Cwens, sophomore women's activities honorary, will get under way at 6:30 tonight at the Frazier street playground.

Continuing until 8:30 p.m., the festival will feature the crowning of a high school Strawberry Festival king and queen, the sale of strawberries and ice cream, and a novelty cake walk.

The festival, which is open to students in the State College school system as well as the College, is for the purpose of raising money to support a Dutch war orphan.

Voting for the king and queen has been going on all week at the State College High School, where students are casting penny votes for their favorite candidates. The candidates receiving the greatest number of penny votes will be crowned king and queen at 8:15 p.m. by Peggy Crooks, president of Cwens.

State College High School students are assisting members of Cwens in the committee work. The cake, which will be awarded to the winner of the cake walk at 7:30 p.m., is being baked by a high school student. The high school students are also assisting in publicity, decorations, and refreshments.

Nancy White, member of Cwens, is general chairman of the festival, and says that "the kids have really been a great help in the arrangement of the festival."

In the event of rain the festival will be held in the Frazier street school gymnasium.

Six Physical Education students are in York this weekend to demonstrate how to hold a picnic.


