Then there was the old campus mule, "Snowball," who was often made the center of campus pranks—sometimes being forced to climb narrow flights of stairs to the tower of Old Main and remain there until the administration found a way to get him down.

When the tower proved too much for the old boy, he was hustled up to the fifth floor where class numerals would be painted on him.

And there were the big bonfires to celebrate important football victories and the molasses feeds which ended up with an indignant "molasses feathering" for all participants. There were the pushball scraps which also got rough at times, and ceased being fun when the enrollment began to increase.

An entirely innocent custom which flourished from 1889 until the '20s was the "graveyard," where various professors were buried in effigy with considerable ceremony.

Altogether, these were the hi-jinks and carryings on of Penn State's past. Undoubtedly when we return in years to come as additions to Penn State's alumni, we, too, will have tales to stand the undergrads at awe.
