Richard Mills, president of the West Dorm Council, will be toastmaster. The Rev. Luther Harshbarger, College chaplain, will give the invocation.

The AIM awards will be presented by Payson Clyde, chairman of the awards committee, to Jesse Arnelle, for athletics; David Olmsted, activities; and James Prete, scholarship.

All independent men are invited to attend the dinner. The dinner costs \$2.50 and reservations must be made by tomorrow. Students who wish to attend the banquet are asked to place their money and name in an envelope and leave it at the Student Union desk in Old Main for Ray Evert.

Herbert Brucker, editor of the Hartford, Conn., Courant, will speak tonight at the dinner meeting of the annual Pennsylvania Press Conference being held today and tomorrow at the College. His topic will be "The Press in a Political Year."

Col. LeRoy Greene, chairman of the judging committee, will present editorial awards to 94 newspaper men and women. The awards are presented annually by the Pennsylvania Newspaper Publishers' Association, the Pennsylvania Society of Newspaper Editors, and the Department of Journalism.
