

Senate Recommends New Customs Rules

Women's Student Government Association last night recommended to Freshman Customs Board that parallel penalties instead of standard penalties be set up for customs violations and that these penalties be of a constructive nature.

Another recommendation, that the wearing of sandwich signs by women be another penalty, was defeated. The Dean of Women's office said that it could not support such a penalty. All recommendations were previously passed by Freshman Council of WSGA and were presented to Senate by Aurelia Arre, president of the Council.

Jobs clearing files in the Dean of Women's office, the Alumni office and other offices were recommended as constructive penalties. Also recommended was the making of "Keep off the Grass" signs.

Other Recommendations

The Senate suggested that instead of having one set penalty for a violation, several equivalent penalties be listed. In this way the student could not weigh the penalty before deliberately committing a violation.

Other recommendations of Freshman Council which were not voted on were, more pep rallies for freshman; a Clean-up Day for the whole freshman class; and bigger build-up of customs during Orientation Week.

Lee Reports

Teresa Taylor, chairman of Judicial, made several proposals to change women's regulations, but discussion on these was tabled until next fall.

Joan Lee, chairman of the convention committee, reported that the WSGA convention held here was "successful" and that 156 women attended it.

After the meeting, a party was held by new members of Senate to honor retiring members.

Freshman Council Lists 5 Customs Suggestions

At its last meeting of the semester Tuesday night, the Women's Student Government Association Freshman Council passed a list of additional customs suggestions to be submitted to WSGA Senate for approval.

Following is the list of suggestions:

1. To provide for the building up of customs during Orientation Week.
 2. To have no standard penalties for customs breakers, but instead a list of parallel punishments in accord with the severity of the misdemeanor.
 3. To have more constructive penalties for customs breakers, such as helping with odd jobs in the Dean of Men's and Women's offices and constructing and putting up "Keep Off the Grass" signs.
 4. To have a clean-up day for freshmen to help rid the campus of paper and trash.
 5. To plan more pep rallies during Orientation Week to teach freshmen Penn State cheers and songs.
- The board also suggested that it be made clear to incoming freshmen that breaking dating customs come under freshmen regulations, and therefore is a more serious offense.
