Oliver to Speak At Keystone

Dr. Robert T. Oliver, head of the Department of Speech, will speak on "What Korea Means to You and to America" Saturday at the 81st annual commencement of Keystone Junior College, La-Plume.

Dr. Oliver, counselor to the Korea commission to the United Nations for six years until the Korean Republic was established in 1948, is an outstanding American authority on Korea. He has served on the faculty of the University of Korea and the Asia Institute in New York.

He is presently a consultant to the Korean Pacific Press. He has served as the manager of the Washington bureau of KPP.

Dr. Oliver is the author of six books on Korea and six textbooks on speech.

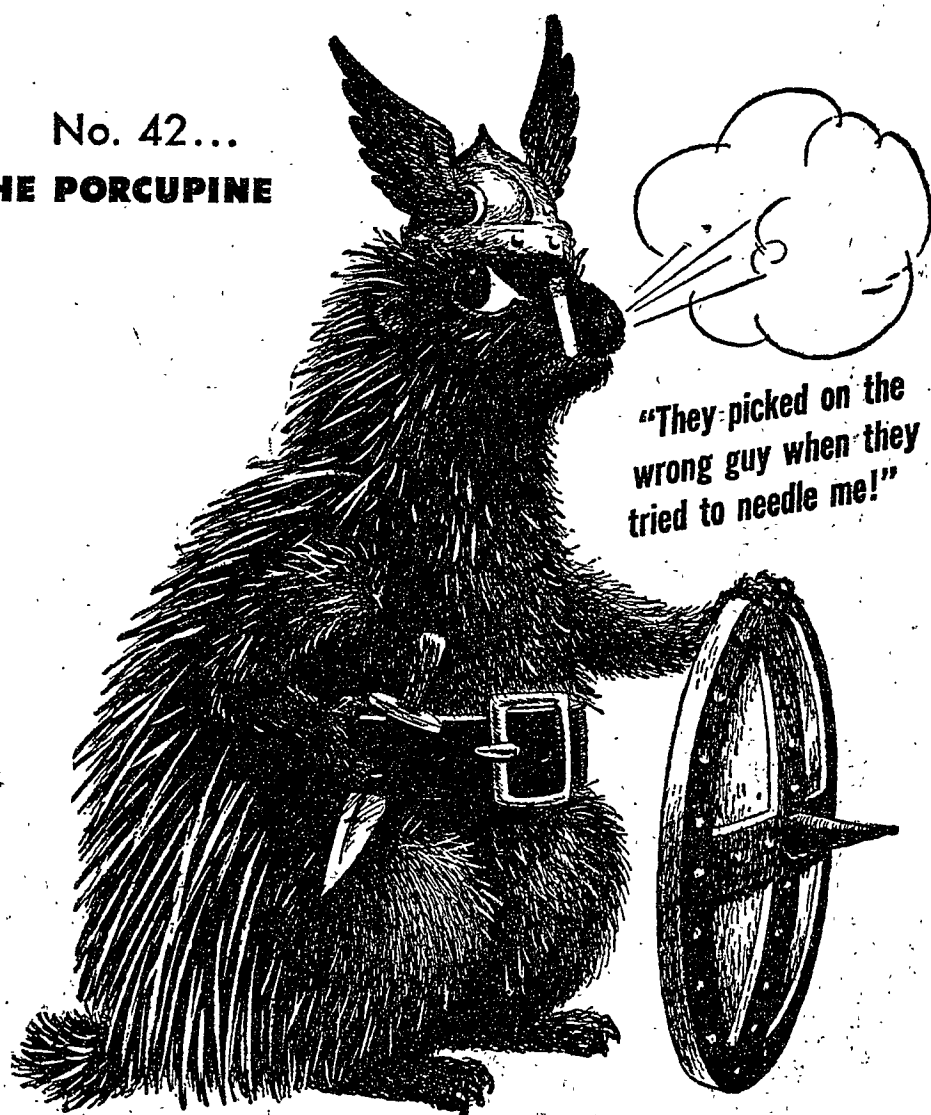
