Alpha Phi Alpha Sweeps IM Track; Records Fall

Three field records were smashed last night while Alpha Phi Alpha swept the fraternity end of the intramural track meet on Beaver Field.

Sam Green of Alpha Phi Alpha set a new shot put record and picked up five points for the winning Alphas, throwing the shot 40' 8½". Bob Gower, ATO ace leaped 20' 7¾" to crack the old broad jump record. Al Hinkle of Lambda Chi Alpha cleared the bar at 5'9½" setting a new high jump record. Hinkle won the championship last year clearing 5'8".

Alpha Phi Alpha, in winning the meet, compiled 18 points, while ATO could muster only 10 to gain the second place position. Alpha Zeta tied with Beta Theta Pi for third. They each had 7 points apiece. In winning the meet, the Alphas picked up two first place positions, one third, two fourths, and a fifth place.

Highlights of the meet: Levan Gordon's sizzling 440 yd. run. He did it in 53.3 seconds. The three new field records, seldom happens in one meet... Joe Polito's 10.7 clip in the 100 yd. dash... Theta Kappa Phi's 880 yd. relay run, clocked at 1:40.1 and good for a first place. The battle between Jay McMahan and winner Hinkle in the high jump. McMahan missed at the 5' 9½" mark.

Bedenk's lineup will be strengthened by the return of centerfielder Sil Cerchie, who was out of action in the Penn game because of torn ligaments in his knee. Cerchie received this injury in the Dickinson game last Friday as he attempted to steal home.

The remainder of the lineup will stay the same with the infield comprised of Mike Hunchar, 1b, Bill Mihalich, 2b, Carmen Troisi, ss, and Hubie Kline, 3b; the outfield consisting of Captain Bill Hopper, Chris Tonery, and Cerchie; the catching being handled by Bill Leonard.

Monday in Scranton a five man NCAA committee will determine which team from Penn State's District 2 will be represented in the Little World Series, June 17-19, in Omaha, Neb.

Tuesday the Lions will close their season at Bucknell.

Jaspers Given Edge Over Lion Runners

Along with their difficult task of matching Manhattan's depth and running prowess, Penn State's track forces will enter tomorrow's Van Cortlandt Stadium meet with a nine point deficit.

For the second time this year, Coach Chick Werner's charges are faced with such a pre-meet handicap. The Jaspers will automatically pick up nine effortless markers before the contest starts, because State doesn't have a hammer throw entry. The same situation existed two weeks ago at West Point, N.Y.

On the basis of their past performances, it is a safe bet that Coach George Eastman's cindermen probably won't even need the pre-meet margin.

The Metropolitan champs have one of the strongest cinder teams in the East. Re-enforced by last year's superb frosh squad, the Green and White clad spikesters have been sweeping titles left and right, and are strong favorites to garner the outdoor IC4A crown.

Most of their previous success can be attributed to their all-around depth and field strength, particularly in the sprint department.

Bob Carty, Joe Schatzle, Lindy Remigino, and Vern Dixon have been more than exceptional in earlier shattering exploits. These four have been the most consistent point scorers of the season, especially in the relay events.

Of the select group, Carty is the most versatile in that he sprints, broad jumps, and also toils in the mile relay. Carty has never been beaten as anchorman on the relay squad.

The four top flight sprinters should be at their best when they run against State's Bill Polito, Captain John Lauer, Skip Slocum, Dave Leatham, and John Milsom.

Golfers to Play Final Match

The Penn State golfing season will draw to a close tomorrow as the Lion's "green" team takes on the Red Raiders of Colgate.

The squad will leave today at 1 p.m. for their trip to New York. Practically the same team that's been playing all season will oppose Colgate.

State's record so far this season shows an impressive 3 wins over 1 loss. They lost a very tough one to Navy last Saturday when Navy's Strobecker, golfing in the final hole against Kreidler, sank his last shot to barely squeeze by George and take the match and consequently, the game.

The Lions' wins came against Pitt, Cornell, and Bucknell.

Defensively, it will be Barr Asplundh, Dick Schaefer, and John Henry.

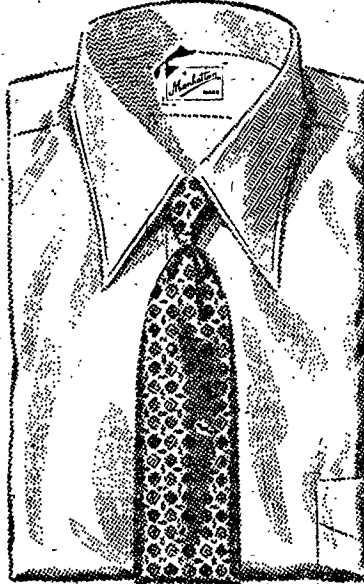
At goalie, sophomore Don Bell will start.
