

Lacrosse, Golf, Track to Play Away

Penn State's lacrosse team will close a disappointing season today at Hobart, facing a team that has won seven games, including two from Cornell, and dropped but two.

It will be the 16th game of a series that began in 1914, each team having scored seven wins against one tie.

State will have to halt the "S" scoring combination of sophomore Johnny Snap and Hoover (Scoop) Sutton if it hopes to pull one from the fire.

Prior to Hobart's last match with Cornell, Snap registered 27 goals and 12 assists while Sutton had 21 goals and eight assists.

Linksmen at Colgate

The Penn State golfers oppose the Red Raiders of Colgate today at New York for their final match of the season.

Starters for the Lions will be much the same team that golfed State to an impressive three win-one-loss record so far this season.

Gordon Stroup, medalist against Navy last Saturday; Rod Eaken, Hud Samson, Joe Webb, George Kreidler, Warren Gittlen, and Bill Albert will be the starting seven. Bobby Smith, a junior, will act as the alternate.

The Lion's lone loss 4-3, was at Navy's hands. Victories were over Pitt and Cornell, 5-2, and Bucknell, 9-0.

In golf, none of the first five in last year's field, including winner Bob Schoener, Allentown, will be numbered in the 40 qualifiers.

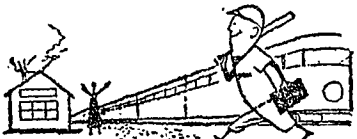

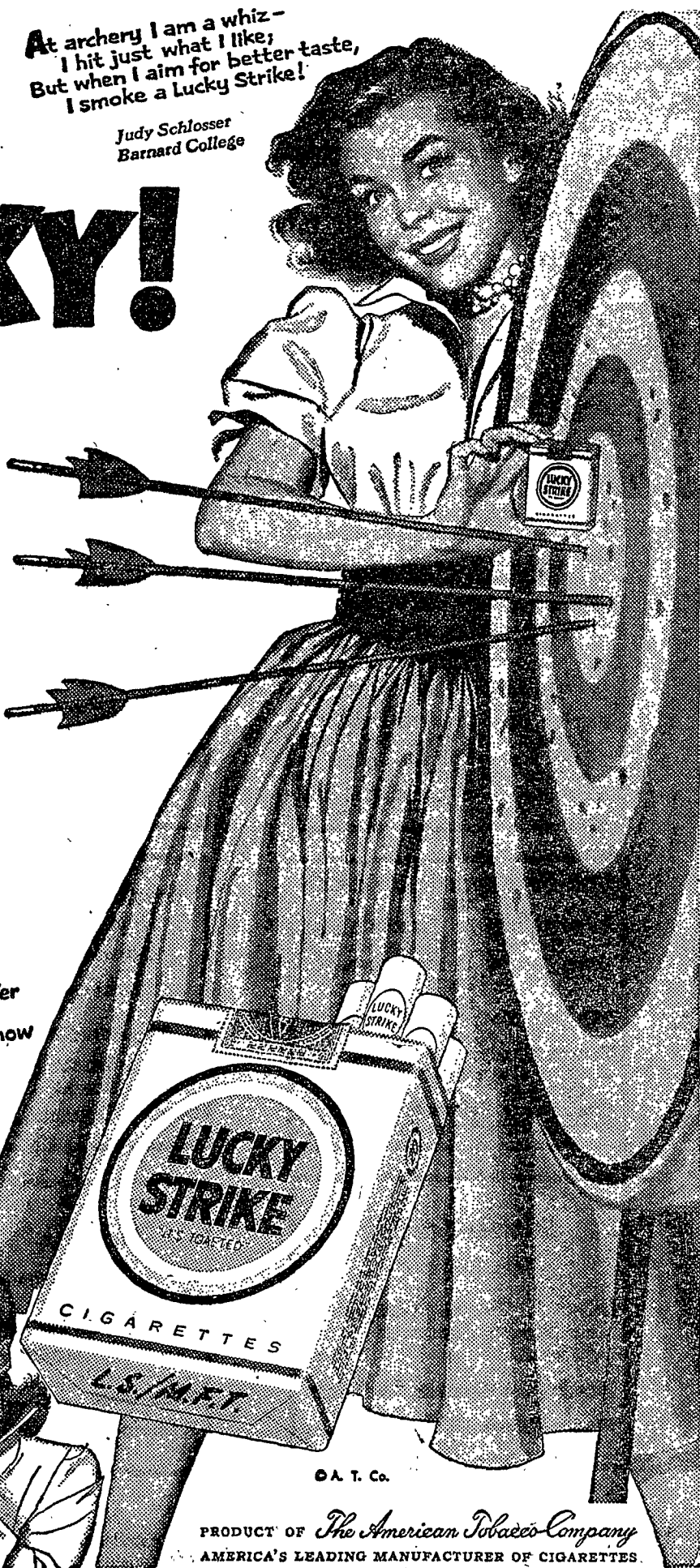
