Speech Clinic Receives \$57

A group of life insurance men have contributed \$57 to support work which is being done for handicapped children in the Speech and Hearing Clinic.

The donation came from men who attended the fifth annual Institute of Life Insurance Marketing, held at the College last summer.

Dr. Eugene T. McDonald, clinic director, said that gifts were used to obtain necessary materials which they would not otherwise be able to get "for helping these handicapped youngsters in their efforts to improve their ability to communicate."

Dr. McDonald said there are approximately 1,000,000 children in Pennsylvania handicapped in speech and hearing. He also said 1,000 qualified speech and hearing therapists are needed for schools but there are only approximately 100 persons so trained in Pennsylvania.

Therefore, only a small number of these handicapped children are receiving remedial attention, Dr. McDonald said.

Delta Chi National Elects Two Profs

Dr. Marsh W. White, professor of physics, was elected national president of Delta Chi fraternity, and Dr. Alex Black, professor of animal nutrition, was made director of educational activities at the international convention held recently at French Lick, Ind.

Barea Publishes 3 Spanish Novels

"The Forging of a Regal," the collective title of three novels written by Arturo Barea, visiting professor of Spanish, has been published for the first time in his native Spanish, the language in which it was originally written.

Individually entitled "The Forge," "The Track," and "The Clash," the novels were originally published in England in 1941 in English. Since that time they have been published in the United States, France, Italy, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, and Holland.

Danish publishers interested in the novels have launched a campaign to have Barea considered for a Nobel prize.

Air ROTC Linked To Maxwell Base
