Applications for the Selective Service college qualification tests to be given Dec. 4 and April 23 will be distributed Monday and Tuesday in the lounge on the second floor of Old Main, Frank J. Simes, assistant dean of men, announced yesterday.

Students wishing to apply for the tests may obtain applications between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on

those days.

To receive applications, students must have their Selective Service registration card and number. Persons who have recently reached the age of 18 and whose registration forms are being processed will be able to receive applica-tions even if they have not yet received their registration cards.

To be eligible to take the col-

lege qualification test, the appli-cant must intend to request occupational deferment as a student, must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course leading to a degree, and must not have pre-viously taken the test.

Zahir, who spoke to the All-College Cabinet Campus Chest committee and College officials last night, said that Indonesian students took active part in the fight for independence from Dutch rule. The students still consider themselves responsible for the maintenance of that independence, he said.

Before World War II, Zahir said, there were three institutions of higher education with a total of 500 students. There are now six universities and five colleges with a total enrollment of 18,000,

he said.
