

# Regulations Set For Motorcade

Regulations for the competitive motorcade, to be held Oct. 18 before the homecoming football game, were announced yesterday after a conference among Fred M. Coombs, chairman of the Pennsylvania Week Committee; Arthur Rosfeld, president of the Interfraternity Council, and Marlene Heyman, president of Panhellenic Council.

The list of regulations will be distributed by Rosfeld tonight to members of the IFC.

At a meeting of the Pennsylvania Week committee yesterday, Coombs appointed the following committee members judges for the motorcade: Dr. Jean D. Amberson, professor of home economics education; Oscar F. Spencer, associate professor and supervisor of petroleum and natural gas extension; Dr. Carroll D. Champlin, professor of education; Thomas Hammonds, general extension editor; and Richard C. Maloney, administrative assistant to President Eisenhower, and vice chairman of the central Pennsylvania region of colleges and universities for Pennsylvania Week.

### Judging Points Set

Coombs said at the meeting that independent organizations may also enter floats in the motorcade. All participants must sign up at the Student Union desk in Old Main before 5 p.m. next Thursday, he said.

The criteria for the judging of the floats will be appropriateness to the Pennsylvania Week theme, "Pennsylvania Defends Freedom," eye-catching appeal, the amount of work involved, and the general artistic worth of the float.

Sororities and fraternities are urged to cooperate in this project, Coombs said. Fraternities which desire to work with a sorority should call Miss Heyman at 151 Simmons. Student organizations requesting additional information about the motorcade or the Pennsylvania Week theme should either contact Miss Heyman, or Rosfeld.

### Starting Time Set

According to the regulations, all floats will assemble in the Hort Woods parking lot at 11 a.m. This will enable spectators and alumni to be able to park in other non-restricted areas. The floats will leave their parking places about 12:30 p.m., and circle Beaver Field once, returning to their parking lots by 1:10 p.m. The exact starting time of the motorcade will be determined after all entries have been made, Coombs said.

A certificate will be presented to the winning float, it was decided, to entitle the winner to an engraved permanent trophy. If a sorority and fraternity unit win, both will receive equal trophies. A fraternity may enter only one float.

## Joint Board To Compare Regulations

The Freshman Customs and Regulations Board decided at a meeting Tuesday night to contact ten other colleges for information concerning customs regulations.

Regulations will be compared to those in effect at the College and recommendations for revisions and additions to the present customs program will be made.

James Schulte, co-chairman of the customs board, announced that letters will be sent to Cornell, Duke, Nebraska, Purdue, Ohio State, Syracuse, University of Miami, University of Ohio, University of West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

When answers are received the customs board will meet to make recommendations for next year's customs program. Customs from other colleges may be incorporated and lax customs which proved to be ineffective this year will be revised or dropped.

Freshman customs remained in effect only two weeks at the beginning of the semester. This was the shortest customs period since full customs returned to the College in 1945. Customs were lifted Sept. 27 following the Purdue football game because of the enthusiasm and school spirit shown by the freshman class.

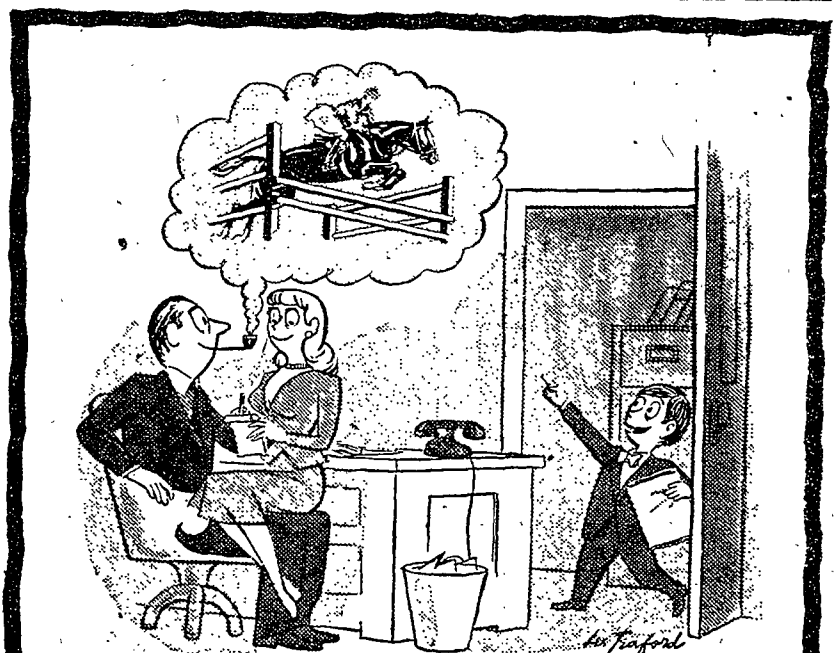
