

# Twelve Elected Convention - Motorcade -- To State Party Steering Group

About 175 students crowded into 228 Sparks at 7 last night to elect 12 representative members to the State Party steering committee.

Eight of those elected were representatives of the eight College schools. They are Barbara Killmer, home economics; George Padaroff, liberal arts; John Lyons, chem-physics; Lewis Hazelwood, agriculture; Sandra Duckman, education; Richard Codari, engineering; Richard Rice, physical education; and Paul Mastrococo, mineral industries.

Other representative members of the steering committee elected last night are Charles Leech, representing fraternity men; Shirley Egle, representing sorority women; Patricia Hennessy, representing independent women; and Gordon Myers, representing independent men.

The new members of the steering committee will meet with the other members at 2 p.m. Sunday at Theta Chi.

Presiding over last night's meeting was Richard Grossman, State Party workshop chairman. Party secretary Lu Weber aided with the elections.

A State Party clique meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Sunday in 121 Sparks.

## Eng Council to Meet Tonight to Discuss Fee

The Engineering Council will meet at 7 tonight in 107 Main Engineering.

Members will discuss the LaVie fee for freshmen along with the election of a new treasurer. Council president Robert Watson requested all freshmen members to attend.

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150 men were expected at the convention. It was reported by a member of the board that 100 places for men could be found and they had hoped to house the rest in rooms vacated by students, with their permission, who had left for the weekend.

The convention committee had told delegates the cost of the convention would be \$3.75 in the two letters mailed to the delegates. Reese said that the committee had assumed that the College's only housing charge would be a small linen fee. Lehman told the board that the Board of Trustees requires the College to charge \$1.50 per night for persons attending a convention. This amount was not included in the \$3.75 registration fee.

Estimation of the cost per delegate was \$7 or \$8. This would have been a cost to AIM of \$1600. Collections from the delegates would have totaled \$750. If this is all the income from the convention, AIM would have been left with almost a \$900 deficit, Lehman said.

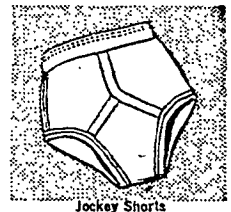
