

Armistice Day To Be Holiday For Employees

Service employees of the College have been granted Armistice Day as a day off, according to Thomas Hartwick, secretary of Local No. 67 of the State, County, and Municipal Employees Union, AFL.

An extra one-half day sick leave per month has also been granted, Hartwick said, and employees on work schedule II have been granted time and one-half for overtime.

The concessions were made during negotiations following the return of strikers Sept. 15. Negotiations are still in progress, he said.

The strike, involving between 300 and 400 service employees of the College, started Sept. 13. The union asked for a 40-hour, 5-day week, uniform vacation and sick leave programs, recognition for all legal holidays, double time for work on holidays, and corrective action on "unfair labor practices."

The letter also said fraternities are trying to combat misguided public opinion and that because the College has such a rule, the public must feel that social life in houses is objectionable. The letter also stated that fraternities have received no assurance of confidence from the College that the situation has improved at all.

(Continued from page one) the fires are being confined to small areas, preliminary reports indicate that national forest losses could reach 10,000 acres, and losses on private lands could reach up to 50,000 acres, Charles L. Tebbe, U.S. Regional Forester, reported.

Thus far Centre County has escaped any large fires. The largest blaze in the area is burning on a mountain above Halfway State Park, beyond Rebersburg and Livonia. The fire started Sunday and has covered about 500 acres. A 25-acre fire between Port Matilda and Bald Eagle in Bald Eagle Valley was put out Sunday night.
