George Black, sponsored by Gamma Phi Beta, was crowned king at the Mardi Gras Friday by Yvonne Carter, president of Mortar Board.

Theta Phi Alpha, with a total of 727 tickets, won the bronze trophy cup. Alpha Omicron Pi, winner for the past three years, placed second, and Phi Mu was third.

Black, a member of Sigma Pi, was presented with a mortar board crown, a gold scepter, and a \$25 gift certificate from Jack Harper's.

The senior women's honorary society sponsoring the affair grossed \$1250.59. After expenses are deducted, about \$900 will be left to turn over to the Charlotte E. Ray Memorial Scholarship Fund, Miss Carter said.
