

# Ike, Dewey to Discuss International Problems

AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 13 (AP)—President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, meeting here tomorrow, will talk over international and domestic problems likely to come up for discussion at the general's conference with President Truman Tuesday.

# UN Law Head Leaps to Death After Quizzing

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—Abraham H. Feller, head of the United Nations legal department who, an assistant U. S. attorney general said, had been questioned by the McCarran Committee, plunged to his death today from his 12th floor apartment overlooking Central Park.

Associates said Feller was a close friend of Alger Hiss, former State Department official now in prison for perjury in connection with accusations that he supplied information to Communists.

Feller, who headed the UN legal department, had been in ill health for about a month, suffering from a nervous condition, associates said.

Police said his wife, Alice, had tried to restrain the \$18,000-a-year executive of the world peace organization.

The general's press secretary, James C. Hagerty, announced today that the President-elect will leave Augusta Tuesday morning by plane for Washington. The conference with Truman is set for 2 p.m.

In Washington, meanwhile, qualified informants said Secretary of State Acheson and other Cabinet officials will sit in at the Eisenhower-Truman meeting.

Hagerty said he did not know whether Eisenhower plans to have any of his aides at the conference.

Immediately after the meeting Eisenhower will fly to New York and go to his Columbia University residence at 60 Morningside Drive.

Present indications are that he will remain in New York until he leaves for Korea—and the date of departure for the war zone still has not been fixed, Hagerty repeated in a reply to a fresh barrage of questions from newsmen.

Eisenhower has been vacationing at the Augusta National Golf Club for the last week. The only appointment he has scheduled prior to leaving for Washington Tuesday is with Dewey.

# U.S. Terms Gas Charges Unfounded

SEOUL, Friday, Nov. 14 (AP)—A sensational charge by South Koreans that Chinese Communists used gas shells early today in capturing Pinpoint Hill was termed unfounded by a U.S. chemical warfare expert.

Lt. Col. Harrison A. Markham, chemical officer of the Ninth Corps, said that one soldier was made ill from picric acid fumes from a regular artillery shell.

Even as the charges were laid to rest, the never-give-up South Koreans returned to the counter-attack and swept up to the top of Pinpoint Hill from which they were knocked a few hours before.

A little less than four hours after they lost the crest, the Koreans struck back in the dark and by 6 a.m. were locked in savage hand to hand combat with Chinese Reds on Pinpoint's summit.

A front dispatch said that the counterattack was powered by the troops who had been forced from Pinpoint in what they said was a Red gas attack.

The charge of gas warfare has been bandied by both sides, with repeated denials. The Geneva Convention outlaws gas in warfare and both the Allies and the Communists maintain they obey these rules.

## McGranery Calls FBI To Investigate Ricca

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—Atty. Gen. McGranery today called on the FBI to find out how a telegram—since repudiated by McGranery—was sent to Chicago directing the U. S. attorney there to stop trying to put gangster Paul (The Waiter) Ricca behind bars.

Ricca is a former associate of gangland chief Al Capone. The Justice Department has been trying to get a court order sending him back to prison to complete a ten-year term for extortion.

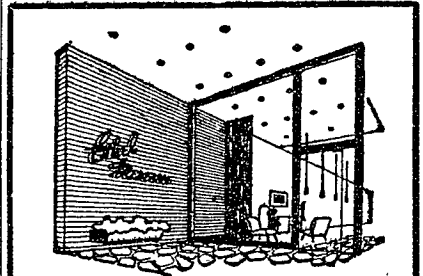
