

## NROTC Test Applications Due Saturday

Applications for selection for the Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps program at the College or 51 other institutions must be filed before Saturday.

Competitive examinations will be held Dec. 13 at test centers throughout the country. According to Lt. Comdr. Richard N. Billings, associate professor of naval science, an examination will be given on campus. On the basis of these tests about 2000 students will be selected for enrollment in the program.

Successful candidates will be appointed midshipmen in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

Application forms, to be filed with the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, N.J., are available from Capt. Rowland H. Groff, professor of naval science.

## College to Get Sewage Plan

College officials will receive a proposal, passed by the State College borough council Monday, to operate a joint borough-College sewage system.

College officials and committees of the Board of Trustees will meet with the State College council to study the problem Dec. 8.

The present plan includes suggestions from both the College and State College council in addition to recommendations by consulting engineers. While no concrete conclusions have been made on solving the joint sewage problem, it was felt that definite progress has been made in view of the two most recent proposals. The matter has been under discussion for six years.

## Stahl Leads Judging Team To 1st Place

Ernest Stahl, sixth semester animal husbandry major, took second individual scoring honors to lead Penn State's livestock judging team to first place in the Eastern National Livestock Show at Timonium, Md., Saturday.

Of the ten competing colleges and universities, the College team, coached by Dr. William L. Henning, rated first in swine, third in beef cattle, seventh in sheep, and ninth in horses, to nose out second place Cornell University.

The team was awarded permanent possession of the show winners' trophy in addition to a check for \$100 and two trophies presented by sheep breeders' associations.

Other members of the team were Joe DePetro, fourth in individual honors; Guy Temple, sixth in beef judging; William Lazar; and Thomas Schmalzried.

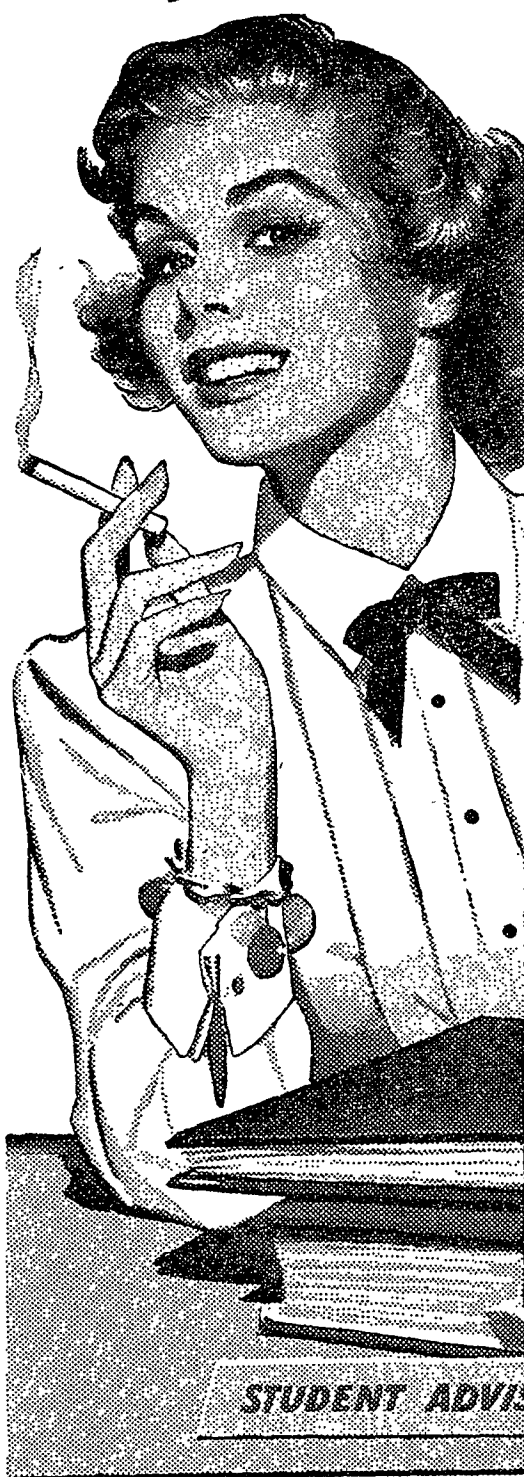

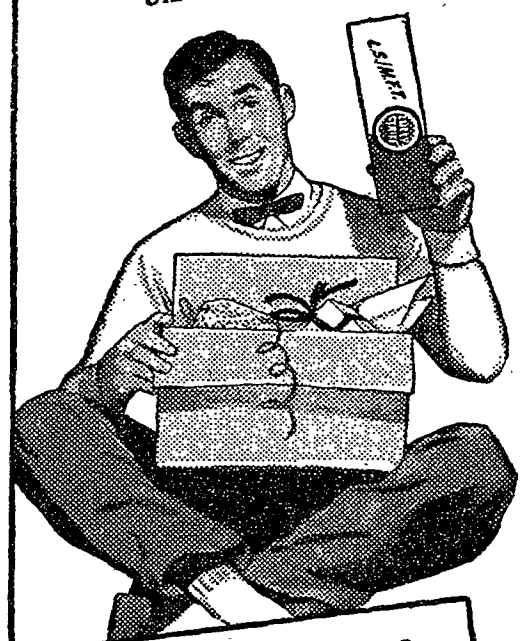
