PITTSBURGH, Dec. 1 (AP) — Police captured two of eight escaped convicts from Western State Penitentiary today and intensified their search for six others who overpowered guards and a deputy warden.

Of the 10 who made a break for freedom instead of attending church services in the big prison, four are back in cells. One was caught on the prison roof and
