

Notre Dame Chemist To Discuss World Order

Dr. Charles C. Price, head of the Department of Chemistry at Notre Dame University and Democratic candidate for representative in Congress, will lecture on "Somos or Chaos—A Scientist Views World Order," at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in 105 Mechanical Engineering.

The lecture will be sponsored by the Liberal Arts committee on international understanding and the International Relations Club. Dr. Price was graduated from Swarthmore College with high honors, and received both a Master of Arts and Doctor of Chemistry degree at Harvard University.

In addition to serving as head of the Chemistry department at Notre Dame, Dr. Price was director of the Office of Scientific Research and Development Projects on Chemical Warfare and Drugs and Malaria. He is also chairman of the University Research Committee at Notre Dame.

Dr. Price is a member of the American Chemical Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science, National Science Foundation, and several other scientific organizations.

He is the author of several textbooks and articles on world federation.

(Continued from page one) dollars a biennium, the report added.

The committee pointed out that, although the state subsidized the teachers' colleges, each year thousands of graduates do not go into teaching. The report suggested a plan whereby graduates be required to teach for a minimum time or reimburse the state for the cost of their education.

The committee also offered suggestions for what it called more equitable and efficient distribution of state subsidies to schools. It noted that if present spending continues at the rate shown by the past ten years, the state would have to increase its grants to 488 million dollars by 1960. At present the state grants 286 million.
