tutors, and editors of textbooks used in the state school system.

The Daily Northwestern has made the news again. The editor, Rick DuBrow, was fired last week by the board of publications in a unanimous decision, for "managerial incompetence, irresponsibility to work with his staff and for failing to produce a newspaper adequately serving the students and the university."

But that didn't end the Board's activities. It further ordered:

- (1) That its statement be printed in full in Tuesday's paper.
- (2) That Rick DuBrow not be allowed to present his statement in the paper.
- (3) That no letters to the editor protesting the firing be printed.
- (4) That a petition signed by the executive staff protesting the manner of firing not be printed.

And they posted four guards at the door to the print shop to see that none of the above could be inserted while the remaining staffers, minus seven editors and several reporters who resigned, put out the paper.

The Marketing Club will meet at 7:30 tonight at Sigma Chi.



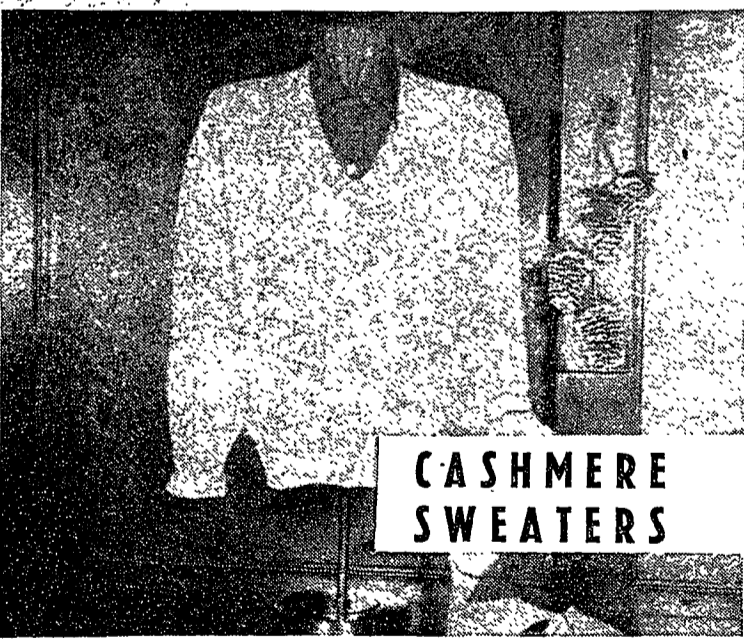

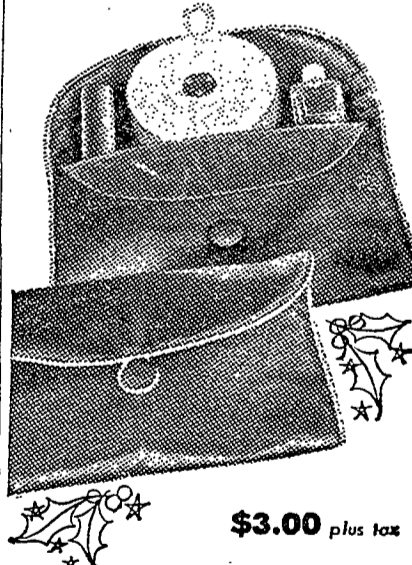
