S. N. Behrman's liberal translation of Jean Giraudoux's "Amphitryon 38" will be presented by Players Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of next weekend at Schwab Auditorium.

Tickets will go on sale Monday at the Student Union desk in Old Main.

H. Dennis Sherk, dramatics in-structor, will direct the comedy, which was the hit of the 1937 Broadway season with Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontaine as stars. The Greek legend concerns King of the Gods Jupiter's court-ship of the all-too-faithful Alkmena. Disguising himself with both the mental and physical as-

pects of Amphitryon, Alkmena's beloved husband, Jupiter wins Alkmena for one night.

Giraudoux, one of France's out-standing dramatists, called his play "Amphitryon 38" as he felt it was about the 38th rendition of the Greek legend. Brooks Atkinson, New York Times drama crit-ic, said Behrman's liberal transla-tion could be called "Amphritry-on 39."


