Bevo Averaging 49.7 a Game

NEW YORK (AP)—Bevo Francis, the scoring robot from little Rio Grande, O., is averaging 20 points a game more than his closest pursuer, NCAA small-college basketball statistics disclosed yesterday.

Francis, a freshman, has poured in 1,343 points in 27 games. That

gives him an average of 49.7 a game—exactly 20 more than runnerup Walt Walowac of Marshall, W. Va.

Walowac has a 29.7 average but is pressed for his No. 2 position by Bob Kowa of Millikin Univer-

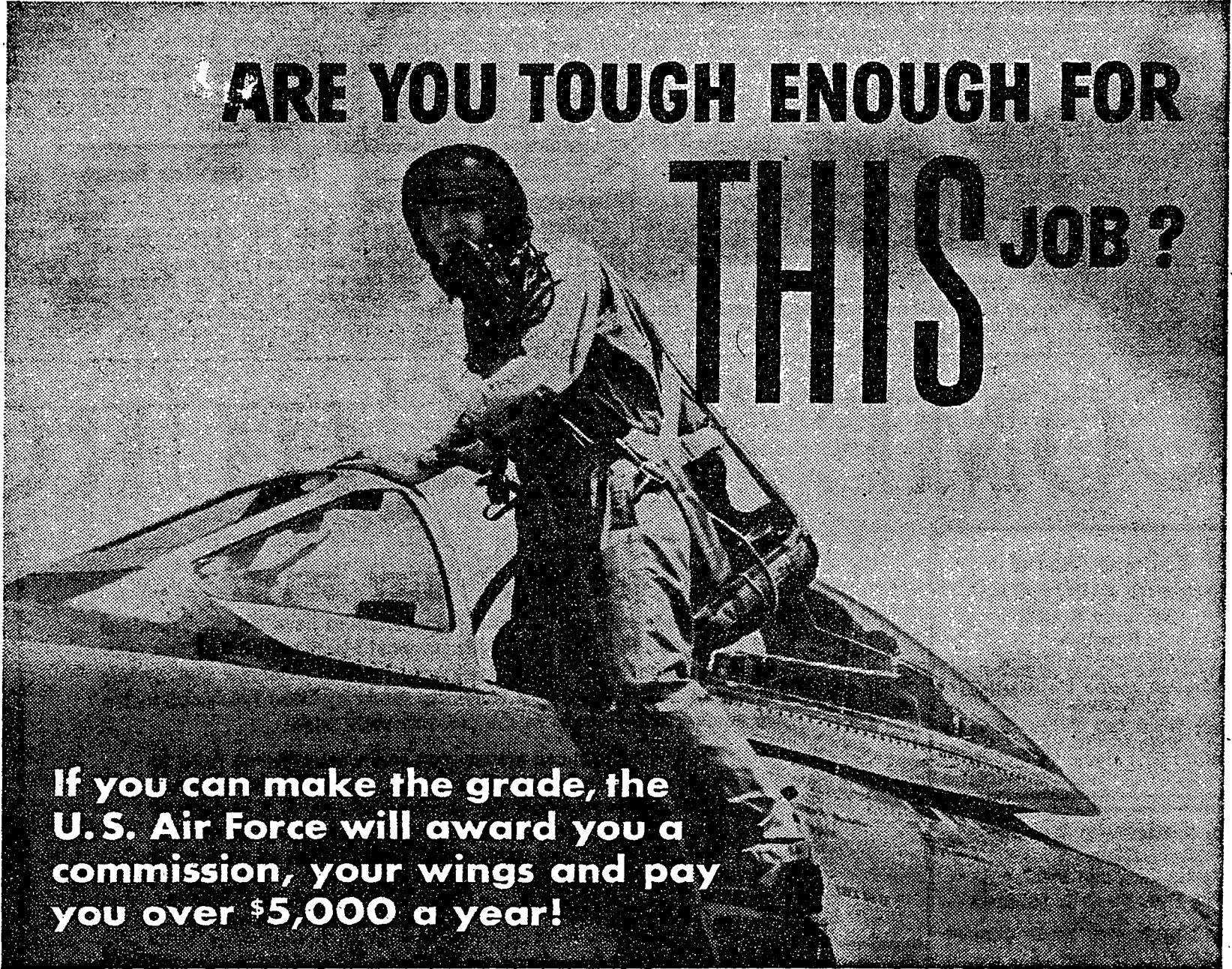
sity, Ill. Kowa has averaged 28.3 a game.

Kowa scored 90 points in his last three games to threaten Walowac.

Walowac maintained his 29.7 point average through the games of Saturday, Jan. 31, while Kowa's spurt gave him a 28.3 point average.
