

## Two Penalized For Dishonesty

Two students yesterday had their final marks altered by Merrill Wood, associate professor of zoology, as a result of dishonesty on fall semester examinations.

One, accused of having crib notes for the complete final, was failed. The other was zipped for neglecting to put his notes out of eyesight as was prescribed at the start of the test.

The offenders had been referred to Wood by the Senate disciplinary committee after its investigation failed to show evidence of a serious enough degree to warrant its action.

The committee gave full approval to the club's proposed constitution at a meeting Jan. 20. Richard Smith, president of the club, was told of the acceptance Monday.

Capt. David H. Hornstein, assistant professor of military science and tactics, has been presented the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in Korea from January to August, 1952. The award was presented to Captain Hornstein by President Milton S. Eisenhower.

Captain Hornstein was graduated from Penn State in 1948 with a B.S. degree in physical education. He was captain of the 1947 basketball team, a member of the track team, Phi Kappa Tau, and Druids and Parmi Nous hat societies.

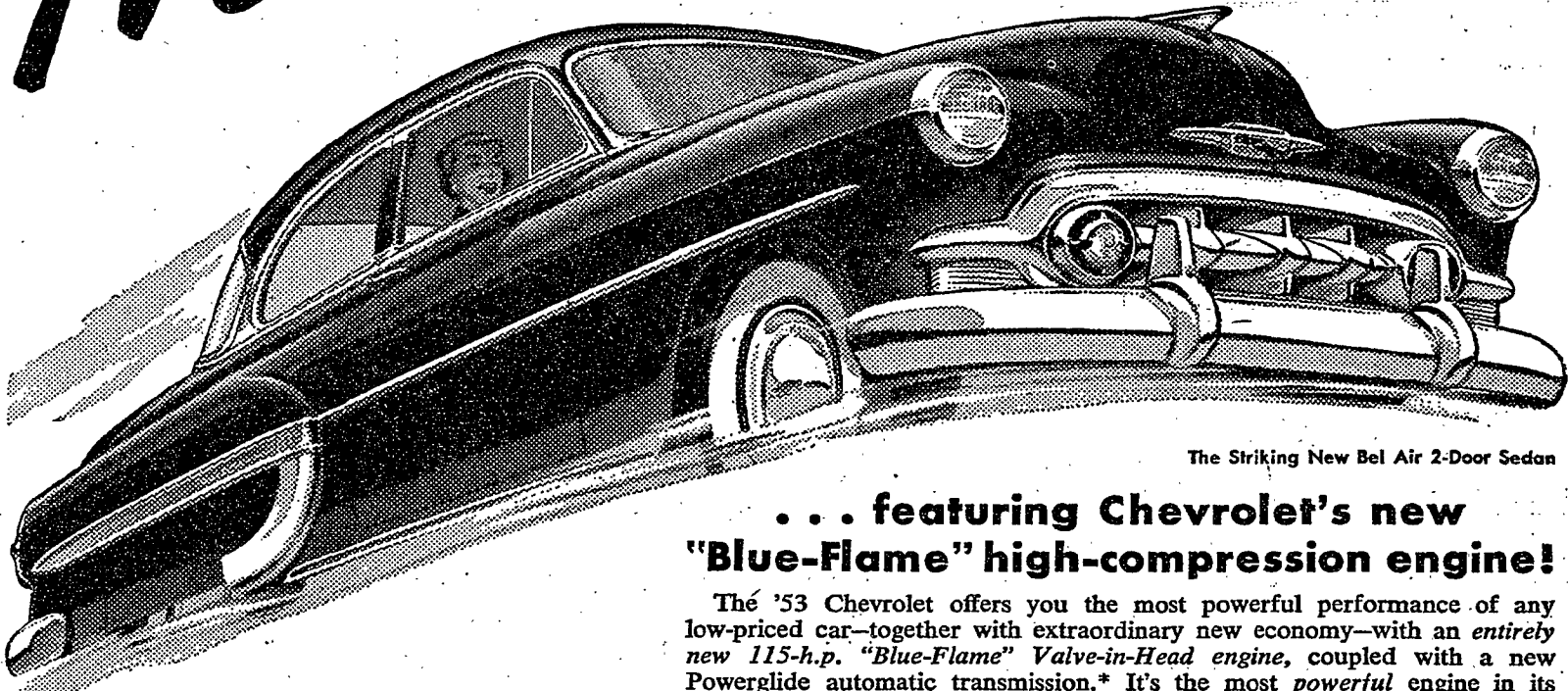
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
