Summer Jobs Outlined

John Crandall, general manager of the Pocono Manor Inn, outlined types of resort jobs and told how to get them at two sessions of a resort seminar held Monday.

Eighty-six students and faculty members attended the seminar.

The three major types of resort jobs, Crandall said, are "work hard jobs, vacation jobs, and career jobs." Tips generally make the earnings good at "work hard" jobs, such as positions as waiters, bell hops, bar boys, greens keepers, and office jobs, he said.

"Free time and pleasant association" make "vacation" jobs attractive, he said. Locker boys, lake front directors, swimming instructors, and tennis instructors come under this classification.

"Usually restricted to hotel administration majors, career jobs, such as positions as dieticians, pastry men, stock clerks, and cooks and chefs' assistants, offer good pay and opportunities for acquiring useful experience, he said.

Waiters and waitresses can figure on making twice as much in

tips as in salaries, Crandall pointed out.

Prospective employees will be doing themselves and their employers a service by contacting someone who has worked at the resort they are applying to in order to check on living conditions before accepting a job, he said.

Don't hesitate to apply for unusual jobs such as caretaker for floral gardens, nursery school attendants, or entertainers, if you qualify, Crandall advised.
