Two freshman coeds and an import have been selected as finalists for the title of the Sweetheart of the Forestry Ball, Temple Reynolds, publicity chairman, has announced.

Shirley Wood, a second semester art major, and her roommate, Joan Ziegler, a second semester music education major, were chosen finalists. Rosey Whetstone, a senior at Bedford High School, will also compete for the title.

The faculty at Mont Alto, a branch of the Pennsylvania State Forest School, selected the finalists.

Miss Wood, a 5-2 blue-eyed blonde from Arlington, Va., will be sponsored by Kappa Sigma. She has worked as a model in Washington, D.C.

Miss Ziegler is a 5-3 brunette from Pittsburgh. The blue-eyed coed will be sponsored by Sigma Chi. She is a member of the Penn State Women's Chorus. In high school she was a member of the Snow Queen's court.

Miss Whetstone, a 5-5 blue-eyed blonde, will be sponsored by Lloyd Arms.

Judges will select the Sweetheart by audience applause at the dance during intermission. Richard Stanley, Agriculture Student Council president; John Laubach, All-College president; and Arthur Rosfeld, Interfraternity Council president, will judge the applause.

A loving cup and victory figurines will be presented to the winner and the runnersup. Photographs of the finalists and the awards will be displayed in the Western Union office window today through Friday, Reynolds said.

The dance, sponsored annually by the Forestry Society, will be held from 9 p.m. to midnight Friday in Recreation Hall. Jim Erb and the Penn State Blue Notes will provide the music.

Tickets, selling for \$2 a couple may be purchased at the Student Union desk in Old Main or from members of the Forestry Society.

CSF Drive Contributions Total \$63.86

Contributions to Interchurch Student Fellowship's drive for a \$250 scholarship for International Christian University which would bear the name of the College now total \$63.86.

The money was raised from proceeds of the recent midwinter ICSF square dance and the offering from an interprotestant worship service at Westminster Foundation Sunday night.

International Christian University is an interracial, interreligious, international university which will open at Mitaka, near Tokyo, Japan, in April. Fourteen Protestant denominations in North America and Europe are contributing to its support.

Wesley Foundation has voted to contribute the offering of a recent meeting to the scholarship fund, and Roger Williams Fellowship and the Westminster Foundation have pledged the offerings they will receive Sunday night.

Edna Peterson, president of ICSF, stressed that contributions for the ICU scholarship will be received at any time during the spring semester. Contributions may be made through one of the local student religion groups or to ICSF directly through Miss Peterson.

House Hears Dance Plans
