The Intercollegiate Conference on Government will meet at 7 p.m. tomorrow in 108 Willard to elect delegates to the state convention in Harrisburg.

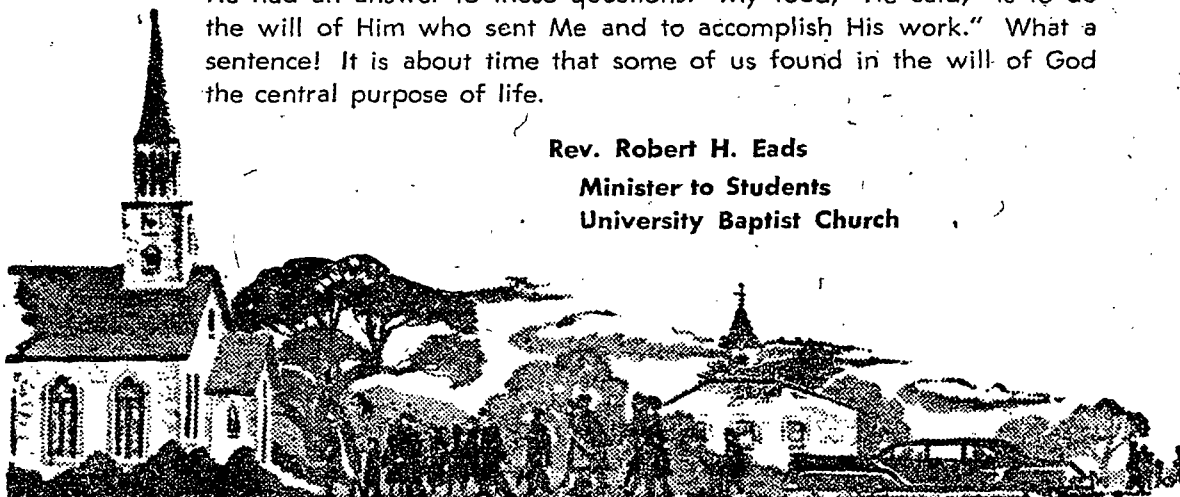
COME TO CHURCH
