

Ag Professor Buried April 2 In Oxford

John B. Rutherford Dickey, professor emeritus of agronomy extension, who died in his State College home March 30 at the age of 64, was buried April 2 in Oxford, Pa.

A graduate of the College in agronomy in 1911, Professor Dickey served as an assistant in agronomy for one year before becoming soil surveyor for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In 1916 he served as an agronomy specialist and also as the first county agent for Burlington County, N.J.

Professor Dickey returned to the College as an assistant professor in agronomy extension in June, 1949.

A member of Alpha Gamma Rho and Phi Kappa Pi fraternities, Professor Dickey served as editor of the Pennsylvania Farmer. He was the author of many articles on Pennsylvania farming and rural life.

He was born Nov. 12, 1888 in Oxford.

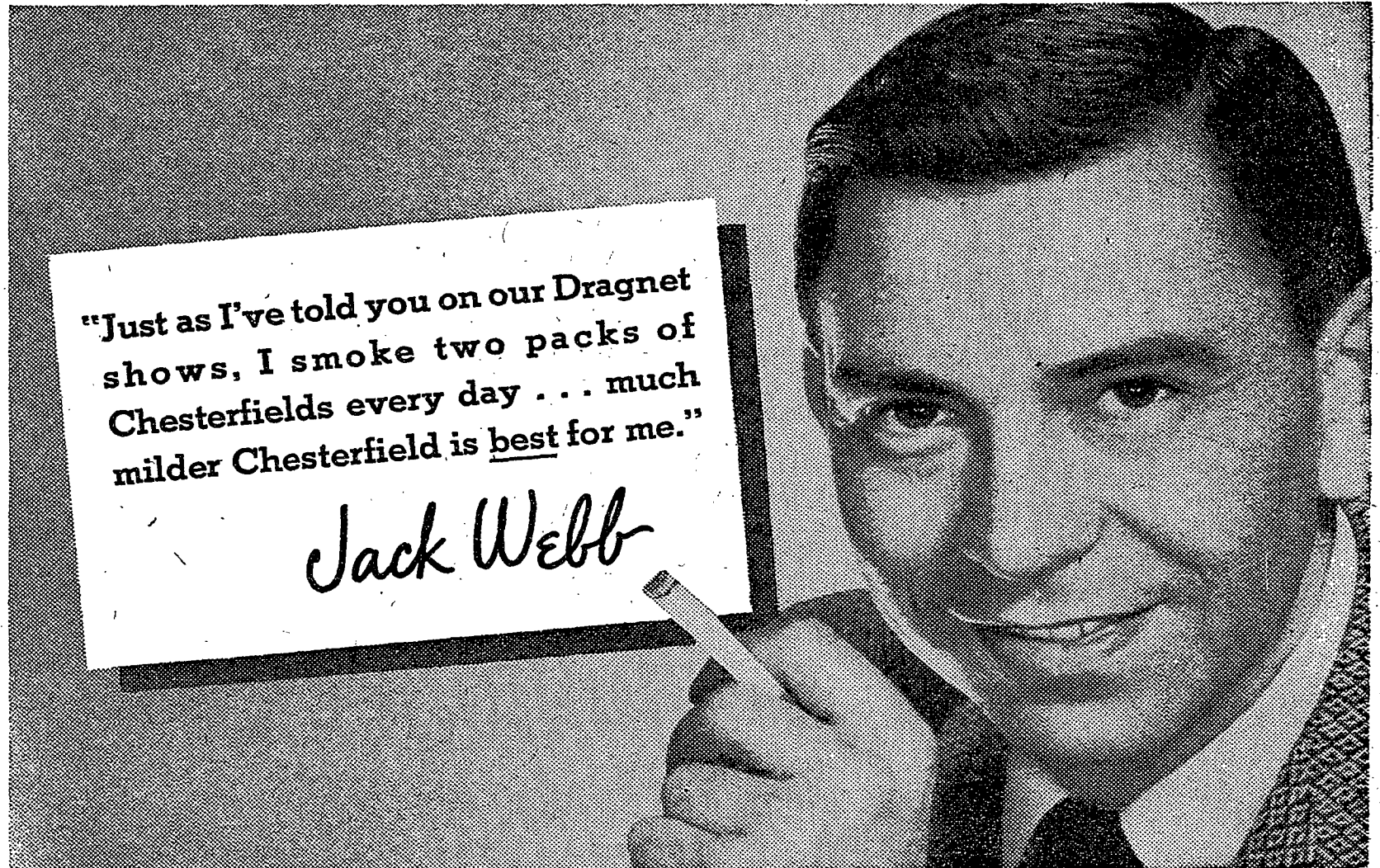

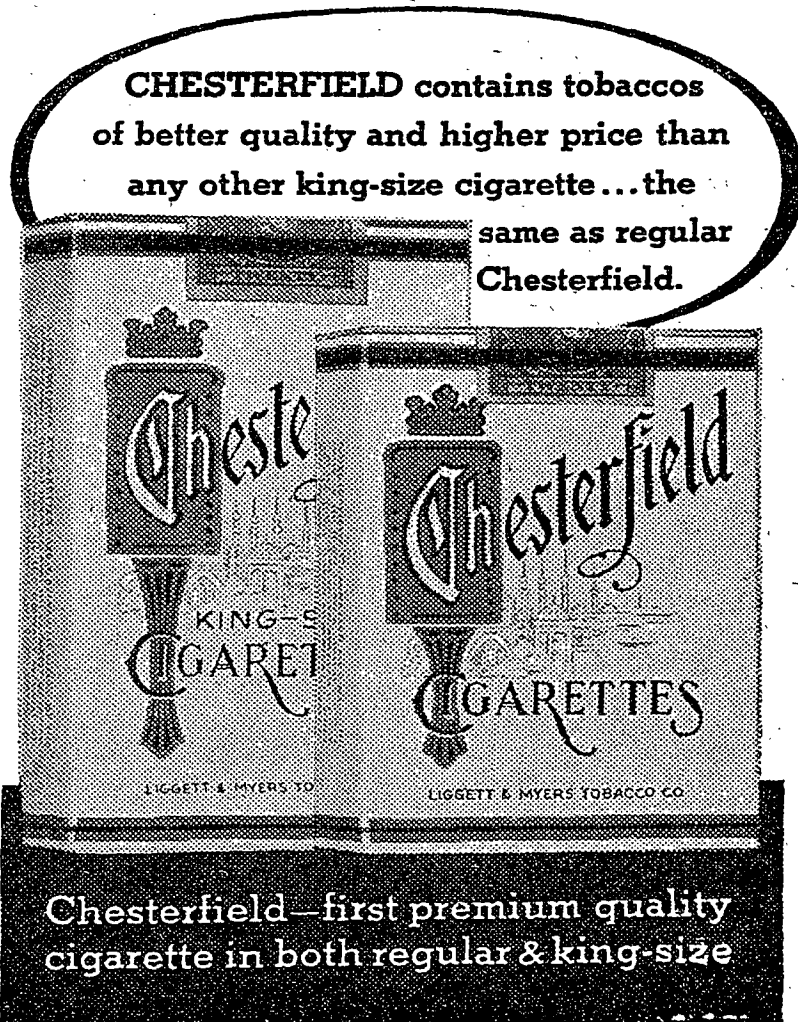
