

\$5 Million Set As Relief Goal

President Milton S. Eisenhower, chairman of the American-Korean Foundation, announced Tuesday that the foundation will attempt to raise \$5 million as a starter in its campaign to help rehabilitate the Republic of Korea's war-ravaged citizens.

The sum will be spent through agencies already at work in Korea and is intended to act as a "yeast" in stimulating the growth of relief and reconstruction in Korea, Eisenhower said.

The foundation, organized in September, depends on voluntary contributions to carry out its program.

The new charges state that the President of the College shall designate "independent legal counsel" to sit with the review board during public formal hearings. The uncertified employee is allowed to choose between public formal or private informal hearings, as in previous procedures.

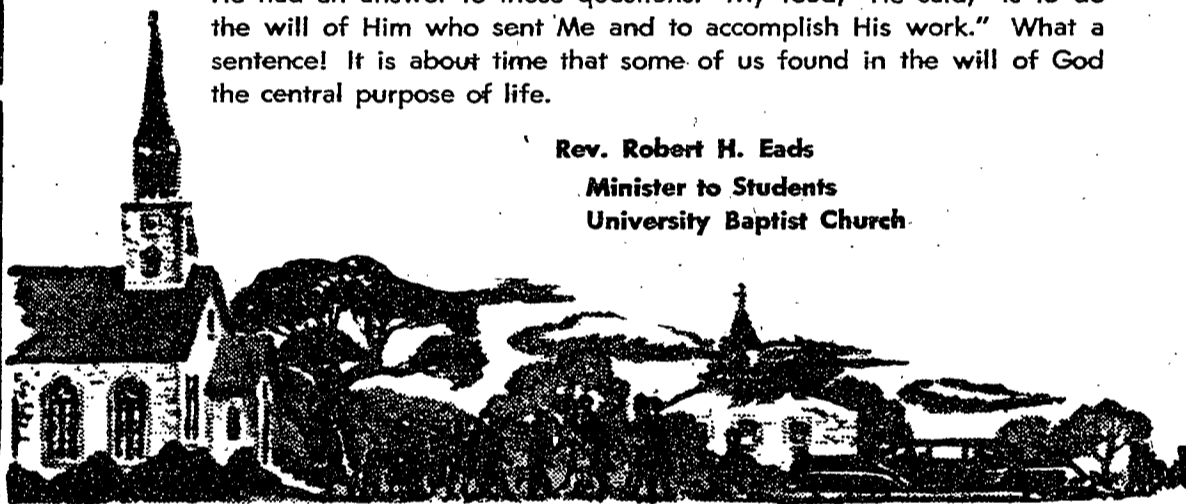
