Donald Plasterer, sixth semester aeronautical engineer, was elected president of the Interchurch Student Fellowship at a meeting Sunday.

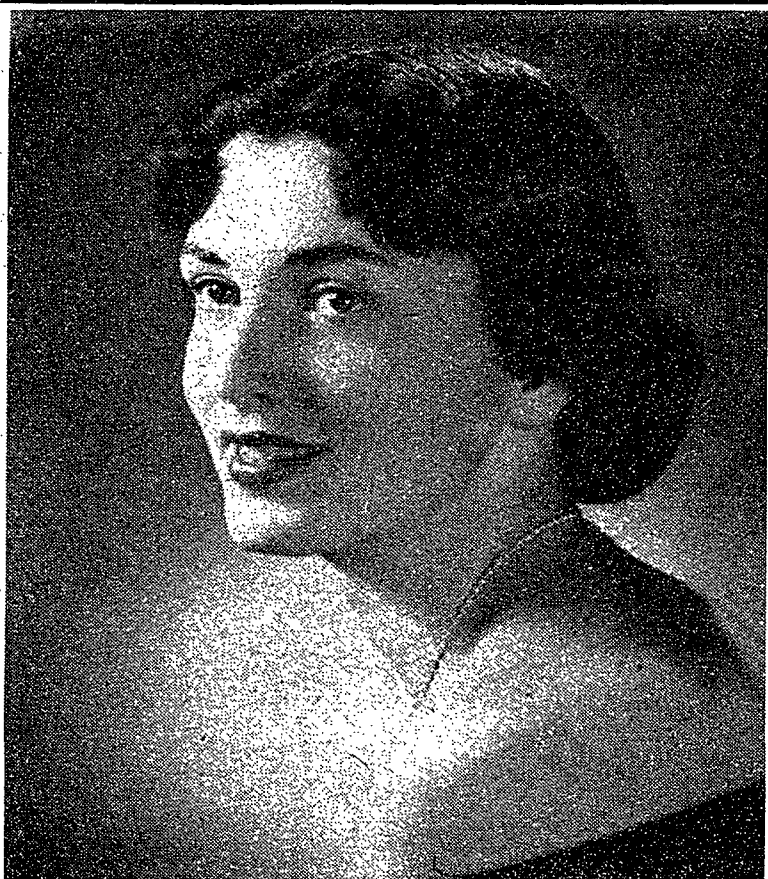
